Field Trip Findings

Nimbus Fish Hatchery (11/12) — Fourteen birders turned out for leader Jeff Mangum's gull clinic that produced primarily Herring Gulls, along with Glaucouswinged, California and Ring-billed species. Other highlights were Barrow's and Common Goldeneyes, a Sharp-shinned Hawk that flushed a flock of Cedar Waxwings from a grape-laden tree, a perched Osprey, White-throated Swifts, Spotted Sandpiper, and a nice scope look at a Red-shouldered Hawk at about 50 feet.

Lincoln Grasslands (11/11) — On a rainy, cold day, leader Tim Fitzer's group managed to record Rough-legged Hawk, Varied Thrush, Rock Wren, Western and Clark's grebes, and Great Horned and Barn owls.

Mather Field (11/5) — Leader Wayne Blunk reported: "In cool overcast weather, our team of 7 identified 35 species for the morning. The Great-tailed Grackles were present but the tules in all parts of the lake were filled with hundreds of male Red-winged Blackbirds. Half way down the levee, a flock of Wild Turkeys showed across Eagles Nest Road as well as a male Pheasant and a male Northern Harrier. One Bittern flew and two juvenile Black-crowned Night-Herons were spotted. Several Spotted Towhees and numerous Ruby-crowned Kinglets filled the trees along the levee. White-Crowned and Golden-crowned Sparrows were sighted as well as numerous Red-Shafted Flickers. A Say's Phoebe was identified in the same area as a Bewick's Wren. Families of Moorhens were numerous with one group of 11 in a short sweep of the scope. The resident flock of Bushtits were in the Cottonwoods on the shore side of the levee. The team ended the morning with three raptors, a male Kestrel, a White-tailed Kite and a

perched, probable juvenile, Red-tailed Hawk."

Sacramento National Wildlife Area

(11/2) - Leader Dan Tankersley reported: "Twelve birders enjoyed an early taste of winter birding on this off and on rainy weekday outing to the Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge. At the office prior to our auto tour loop of the refuge, a game warden informed us that over 150,000 geese and many more than that number of ducks were on, or around the refuge. By our estimates, he did not exaggerate as the birds put on a wonderful show. The group enjoyed great looks at three different "blue morph" snow geese, and distant looks at two adult male Eurasian Wigeon. All in all, the group counted 60 species of birds. On the mammal front, 5 River Otters and 2 Mule Deer added additional pleasure to this fine day in the field."

William Pond Park, American River Parkway (10/31) — No ghosts seen, but leader Jack Hiehle reported Osprey, Green Heron, Double-crested Cormorant, White-tailed Kite, Pied-billed Grebe, Belted Kingfisher and Mute Swan. Jack donned his habitat restoration hat, showed the birders an example of Scarlet Wisteria or Sesbania and challenged them to pull up at least one of the invasive, non-native plants. "They all really got into it, and picked up 50 plants, a learning experience for them," Jack said.

Snipes-Pershing Ravine (10/29) "Nine birders had 33 species of birds with great looks at Cooper's and Redshouldered hawks," leader Mark Martucci reported. "Also, good numbers of Rubycrowned Kinglets and White and Goldencrowned sparrows were seen."

For Christmas counts and trips from January 1 on, call the scheduler Tim Fitzer, 870-5207, spskua1@comcast.net.

Consider car pooling and share gas expenses with the driver. FRS radios can be helpful on all trips. Starting times are the actual time the trip leaves the meeting place. Try to arrive early, especially if you want driving directions or plan to carpool. Groups must make prior arrangements with the trip leader.

Saturday, December 2, Daybreak American River Natural History Association (A.R.N.H.A.) Bird Count Compiler: Jack Hiehle, 967-0777

Join Jack and other volunteers to assist with this annual count of birds and other creatures along the American River Parkway. Results of this count are important to future planning for the Parkway, and the goal is to have 11 teams of two or more persons each. This count differs from other Christmas Counts in that teams count species rather than total numbers of each species. Contact Jack for details, team assignments, and meeting and compilation locations.

Sunday, December 3, 7am Caswell Memorial State Park Leader: Gary Fregien, 451-2767 calaveri@sbcglobal.net

Caswell Memorial State Park is located in the Central Valley near the town of Ripon, about an hour south of Sacramento. The park's position along the meandering Stanislaus River affords a combination of water and riparian vegetation. Although now merely a remnant, the park's 258 acres are mostly wild, in stark contrast to the surrounding agricultural lands, and they present a pristine example of the once extensive riparian corridor along the river. The habitat is primarily mature riparian valley oak woodland and is a magnet for a variety of resident and migrant species. This habitat also harbors the endemic riparian brush rabbit, not known to occur elsewhere. For more information about the park, go to www.parks.ca.gov, click on "Find A Park" and use the drop-down menu to find Caswell. A March, 2006 trip produced 52 species including a Whitethroated Sparrow. There may be a day-use fee to enter the park. Plan to spend several hours in the park, so bring food and water. Trails are primarily level, but may be damp. Dress appropriately. Meet Gary at the Park & Ride on the east side of Hwy 99 at the Sheldon Rd. exit south of Sacramento.

Monday, December 4 8am-early afternoon Davis Wetlands Leader: Sami LaRocca, (530) 908-0288 sami182@charter.net

This trip is planned to take advantage of the weekday opening of the Davis Wetlands at Davis Waste Water Treatment Plant during duck season. By this time many species of ducks and other birds will have taken up winter residence at this very special wetland habitat. Join Sami in identifying as many as possible and in checking the surrounding fields for special sightings. Plan on carpooling to the wetlands from the Park and Ride lot off Mace Blvd. (northeast of I-80; behind Ikeda's fruit stand.) From Sacramento, take I-80 west across the causeway, exit on Mace Blvd. Turn right at the signal, drive downhill and make the next right at Ikeda's. Look for the green Park and Ride sign (2nd driveway after turn.) Bring water, snacks and hiking shoes. Some binoculars will be available for use by adults and children. High winds or significant rain cancels this trip.

Monday, December 4, 8am-Noon Nimbus Fish Hatchery, American River Leader: Jack Hiehle, 967-0777

Walk with Jack down the American River to look for diving ducks, kingfisher, wintering gulls and other wildlife along the River. He will also be sharing his knowledge of interesting archeological points relating to early Chinese gold mining. Meet in the parking lot of the Fish Hatchery off Hazel Boulevard.

Friday, December 8, 8am-Noon Sailor Bar Area American River Parkway Leader: Jack Hiehle, 967-0777

Join Jack in exploring the plants, birds and animals of this riparian corridor along the River. Jack will share his broad expertise on the usual wintering residents of this area. From Winding Way, turn south on Kenneth, then go east on Emperor Street to the end.

Saturday, December 9 7am-mid-afternoon Sand Creek Road/Arbuckle Area Co-Leaders: Tim Fitzer, 870-5207 Sheila Deaner, 607-5447

This recently discovered area covers a variety of habitats and thus a variety of bird species. Join Tim and Sheila in looking for raptors, passerines and grassland species, migrants and residents alike, in this beautiful area north of Sacramento. Roadrunners are often seen as well as possible coyotes, deer and bobcat. Bring liquids and lunch. Due to road conditions, high clearance vehicles are recommended. Call Tim for meeting place and to arrange car pooling.

Saturday, December 9, 8am-Noon Wetlands and Waterfowl Tour Leader: Roger Jones, 875-9174 jonesro@saccounty.net

Tour one of the seasonal or permanent wetland areas within the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District Bufferlands in Elk Grove. The wetlands and waterfowl

tour offers a chance to see many bird and mammal species including waterfowl, shore-birds, raptors, beavers and coyotes. Tour participants will enjoy a short walk guided by a Bufferlands staff wildlife biologist who will explain current management and restoration techniques. Space is limited and the meeting location is weather-dependant, so please contact Roger Jones during the week preceding the event for exact meeting location and directions.

Sunday, December 10, 7:30am-noon Cosumnes River Preserve Leader: Brian Gilmore, 451-9146

This Nature Conservancy Preserve is a rich area just 20 minutes south of Sacramento. Brian will search the ponds and fields for Sandhill Cranes, shorebirds, ducks and geese and the radio tower for the often-present Peregrine Falcon. Walks along the board walk, bridge and trails should turn up other interesting species. Meet Brian at the visitor center parking area on Franklin Boulevard at 7:30am sharp!

Sunday, December 10, 8am Effie Yeaw Nature Center Habitat Improvement Leader: Jack Hiehle 967-0777

Sacramento Bar/Lower Sunrise, American River Parkway (10/24) Several Phainopeplas, both male and female, and Blue-gray Gnatcatchers were the standouts for the 10 participants, reported Cheryl Johnson, co-leader with Dee Warencyia. Others among the 56 species recorded included Green Heron, Sharp-shinned and Cooper's Hawks, Spotted Sandpiper, Hermit Thrush, Blackthroated Gray Warbler, and Fox and Lincoln's Sparrows.

Shadow Glen/Snowberry Creek (10/24) Five Sacramento Audubon members joined the leader, Lea Landry, and a guest, Art, a Naturalist from Great Egg Harbor National Park in New Jersey, on a walk through the various habitats along the Snowberry Creek Trail and Lake Natomas. "At first," Lea reported, "there were more birders than birds. The chilly morning air kept most of the birds snug in their roosts. The first sighting was of a gorgeous Red-shouldered Hawk on the ground with her prey. As the sun rose higher, things rapidly picked up with 35+ of the usual suspects seen in good numbers. Stars of the morning included 4 Phainopeplas at the top of a single tree, an Osprey overhead, and several Downy Woodpeckers, topped off by large groups of Bushtits and Cedar Waxwings."

Coloma Bird Count (10/22) — Leader Maureen Geiger reported: "This Coloma

trip was the last of a series of species counts for the American River Conservancy, which headquarters at the Marshall Gold Discovery Park. Four teams scouted four diverse areas for new birds to up the species counts and were rewarded with some special birds like Red-naped Sapsucker, Band-tailed Pigeon, Lawrence's Goldfinch and Pine Siskin in addition to the more common birds. Overall, 104 species have been found in this lovely area 40 minutes from Sacramento."

Calaveras Big Trees State Park (10/21) Leader Cathie LaZier reported: "A female Williamson's Sapsucker was an unexpected treat on this walk through the multi-hued dogwood and hazelnut understory of the Big Trees State Park. White-headed and Hairy Woodpeckers, Goldencrowned Kinglets, and Mountain and Chestnut-backed Chickadees were also seen. Another unexpected treat was our friend Pierre, who joined us while here on a business trip. The sometimes-seen Pileated Woodpecker was only heard this time, calling and drumming."

Bannister Park (10/20) — Leader Jack Hiehle said best birds were Blackthroated Gray Warbler, Osprey, Hermit Thrush, Hutton's Vireo, Cedar Waxwing, Spotted Sandpiper, Belted Kingfisher and Cooper's Hawk.

typical wintering location in the Robinson Rd area south of Dixon. **Barn Swallows** were unusually abundant well into October, and **Golden-crowned Kinglets** were numerous and widespread. Finally, there were multiple mountain lion reports from different areas of the Cosumnes River Preserve.

For all that our area has to recommend it as a birding mecca-abundant waterbirds, Sandhill Cranes, winter raptors, migrant songbirds through the Valley riparian forest, coastal and montane influences-it is not typical for a rarity of continental significance to turn up here; but on 10/25, that is just what happened. A Taiga Flycatcher was found and photographed near Winters along Putah Creek at Fishing Access #2. Not only was this a first state record, but a first for mainland North America. This Asian species, recently split from Red-breasted Flycatcher, was only previously known on this continent from Alaskan islands. As luck would have it, one of the finders, John Sterling, has done ornithological work in Siberia, and is familiar with the species. Folks who were able to drop everything and see the bird on 10/25 were rewarded, as the bird flew back and forth over the creek from Solano to Yolo County. Over 100 others who streamed in from all over the state and beyond the following two days were disappointed; sadly, the bird did not stick around. Nevertheless,

From a rarity standpoint, anything else was bound to play second fiddle. Still, a new species for Yolo County was found on 10/20 when an American Tree Sparrow was mist netted and banded at the Yolo Wildlife Area along the tour loop. Through at least 10/26, many were able to enjoy two of these attractive sparrows. Two American Golden-Plovers were reported along the tour

flyover of Slide Hill Park in Davis on 10/11, an **Eastern Phoebe** near the park on 10/16, and a **Blackpoll Warbler** in north Davis on 10/6. The Cosumnes River Preserve produced a num-

Cosumnes River Preserve produced a number of interesting records over the month. On 10/1, the county's first **Ovenbird** was reported along with a **"Baypoll" Warbler**. The latter bird was not seen well enough to determine if it was a **Blackpoll** or a **Bay-breasted Warbler**. A **Black-throated Sparrow** was found on 10/26 and continued through at least 10/28. On 10/29, a late **Wilson's Warbler** was found, along with the first **Tundra Swans** for the season. A **Peregrine Falcon** was a fairly regular early morning fixture on the microwave radio tower on Bruceville Rd.
