# Field Trip Findings

**Upper Sunrise** (11/13) – Great weather and 60 species were enjoyed by ten birders along the American River Parkway. Leader Mark Martucci said highlights included eight Phainopeplas in one group, a male Barrow's Goldeneye and a great look at a Blue-gray Gnatcatcher. Also, a very cooperative River Otter swam around a small pond on the north side of the river for at least 10 minutes before the group moved on.

William Pond Park (11/10) – Leader Jack Hiehle's group recorded Osprey, Whitetailed Kite, Cooper's Hawk, California Quail, Spotted Sandpiper, Fox Sparrow and Greater Yellowlegs.

Sacramento National Wildlife Area (11/10) - Five birders enjoyed this midweek outing in unseasonably warm weather, leader Dan Tankersley reported. "A full day in the field provided 61 species, with great opportunities to compare Ross's and Snow Geese side by side. While the geese had not arrived in expected numbers, the ducks were well represented, with Northern Pintail being the species with the highest number on the refuge by far. We enjoyed watching an adult Golden Eagle flying low over geese in the fields, and watching the geese rise almost in unison. When the eagle tired of harassing the geese, it moved over different ponds to give the ducks the same thrill."

**Bodega Bay** (11/5) – Dan Brown has led many trips to Bodega Bay but this was one of the better ones he said. "Weather was great – no wind and warm, and a very high tide had pushed the birds close to the shore. We were able to drive to within a few yards of a mixed flock of about 1,000 Godwits and Willets, etc," he said. "The tide also pushed the birds up onto the rocks of the jetties. The north jetty was covered with Dunlin from about halfway out to the end, and the south jetty was covered with gulls, pelicans, turnstones and Surfbirds, along with 11 Black Oystercatchers." Other highlights were Red-necked Grebe, Red Knot, Thayer's Gull, Brant, five Peregrine Falcon sightings (maybe only one or two birds) and one female Harlequin Duck.

Serrano Parkway, Eldorado Hills (10/30) Leader Maureen Geiger reported: "We had wonderful weather for our trip near Serrano Parkway and along New York Creek. Twenty of us chalked up almost 40 species. Two highlights: the gorgeous Red-shouldered Hawk sitting close was well seen, ripping some hapless furry creature to shreds and chowing down. The other was a tiny hummingbird nest on the trail along New York Creek."

**Calaveras Big Trees State Park** (10/29) "Bird numbers were low on this trip, but we did see a Winter Wren, Goldencrowned Kinglets, and Chestnut-backed and Mountain Chickadees," leader Cathie Lazier reported. "There were many interesting fungi as a result of recent rains, and the dogwoods, Black Oak and Big-leaf Maple were all in nice color. The Big Trees were big as usual, and very impressive."

**Bannister Park** (10/27) – Leader Jack Hiehle reported this American River Parkway site yielded Ring-necked Pheasant, Hermit Thrush, Phainopepla, and Spotted Sandpiper.

**Bobelaine Sanctuary** (10/23) – A White-faced Ibis seen en route to the refuge was a good beginning on this gorgeous day with blue skies and and crisp morning temperatures that warmed to 80 degrees. Cedar Waxwings were found in great numbers. Varied Thrush, Great Horned Owl and Band-tailed Pigeon were good finds, along with a beaver crossing the river, leader Carla Barbaro reported. Others

Plan to pool cars and share gas expenses with the driver. FRS radios can be helpful on nonlocal trips. Starting times are the actual time the trip leaves the meeting place. Try to arrive early, especially if you want driving directions or plan to carpool. Groups must make prior arrangements with the trip leader.

#### Thursday, December 1, 8am-noon Nimbus Fish Hatchery Leader: Jack Hiehle, 967-0777

Walk down the American River to look for diving ducks, kingfisher, wintering gulls and other wildlife along the River. Jack's knowledge of this area always assures an interesting and informative trip. Meet in the parking lot of the Fish Hatchery off Hazel Boulevard.

#### Saturday, December 3, Daybreak American River Natural History Association (A.R.N.H.A.) Bird Count Compiler: Jack Hiehle, 967-0777

Join Jack and other volunteers to assist with this annual count of birds and other creatures along the American River Parkway. Results of this count are important to future planning for the Parkway, and the goal is to have 11 teams of two or more persons each. This count differs from other Christmas Counts in that teams count species rather than total numbers of each species. #### Sunday, December 4, 7:30am Sharp Cosumnes River Preserve Leader: Brian Gilmore, 451-9146 e-mail: b2gilmore712@comcast.net

Join Brian at this Nature Conservancy area 20 minutes south of Sacramento. He will search the ponds and fields on Desmond Road for Sandhill Cranes, shorebirds, ducks and geese, and the radio tower for the often-present Peregrine Falcon. Walks along the boardwalk, bridge and trail areas should turn up other interesting species in this rich riparian area. This trip will last until late morning.

#### Tuesday, December 6, 8am-noon Sailor Bar Area American River Parkway Leader: Jack Hiehle. 967-0777

Join Jack in exploring the plants, birds and animals of this riparian corridor along the River. Jack will share his broad expertise of the usual wintering residents of this area. From Winding Way turn south on Kenneth, then east on Emporer Street to the end.

Explore the varied habitat of the Lincoln hills with Dave who knows this area well. He will be checking the ponds and other nearby sites for ducks and shorebirds as well as the "grand canyon of Lincoln Hills" (otherwise known as the Canyon Oaks Trail) for sparrows, other winter residents and raptors. Take Hwy. 65 north, turn right on Twelve Bridges Drive, left on East Lincoln, right on Del Webb Blvd., and follow to the Meridians Restaurant. Meet Dave in front of the lodge in the parking lot. This trip will end late morning.

Tour one of the wetland areas within the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District Bufferlands in Elk Grove. The wetlands and waterfowl tour offers a chance to see many bird and mammal species including waterfowl, shorebirds, raptors, beavers and coyotes. Tour participants will enjoy a short walk guided by a Bufferlands staff biologist who will explain current manage-

among the 49 species counted included Wood Ducks, Swainson's Hawks, Nuttall's and Acorn woodpeckers, and Fox Sparrow.

**Shadow Glen/Snowberry Creek** (10/22) Leader Lea Landry was joined by 10 birders, including four excellent leaders (pressure, pressure!), on a walk along a wonderful trail in Orangevale on a beautiful day. They were rewarded by good looks at 39 species of the usual fall suspects in oak and riparian habitats. Highlights included close-up views of a beautiful Red-shouldered Hawk, a patient Hermit Thrush, and a lovely Lincoln's Sparrow.

## ONE OF THE YEAR'S BEST RARE BIRD FINDS

Two Sharp-tailed Sandpipers from Asia, turned up at the Vic Fazio Yolo Bypass Wildlife area in November, drawing an influx of birders from all over to the East Yolo County site in hopes of seeing it. Most descriptions likened it to a Pectoral Sandpiper, having a buffy breast with little streaking, a rufous cap and yellowgreen legs.

Frequent Sacramento Audubon trip leader Maureen Geiger offfered this account: "I had the great fortune to see clearly, closely and for a while the brighter of the two Sharp-tailed Sandpipers on November 2. I raced out there early in the morning while Cliff Hawley and Daryl Colgron were there and was able to piggy-back on their find. It was a lovely bird, looking exactly like the juvenile in Sibley and I felt verly lucky as it was a life bird for me. There were a couple of Pectoral Sandpipers nearby that morning, too. I had seen them at Yolo before but never so close. This really is a great time to go there - all that water and all that wonderful new habitat. It's growing up."

## Seasonal Observations

#### October 1 to October 31 Rare and Unusual Bird Reports 783-2331

The avian highlight of the month came on 10/31 in the form of a juvenile Sharp-tailed **Sandpiper** along the auto tour route at Yolo Wildlife Area. A second juvenile, somewhat brighter than the first, was found the following day, and reports continued sporadically through 11/12. These striking Siberian shorebirds are very rare but annual fall vagrants along the California coast, though much less common inland. Somewhat surprisingly, there are six previous records for Yolo County, but this was the first in over a decade. Several Pectoral Sandpipers, to which this species is closely related, were also noted in the area. The excellent habitat along the tour route supported 100-200 Wilson's Snipe. Another shorebird highlight was a **Ruff** in Placer County near Brewer and Catlett Rds on 10/29 and 10/30. This species, which had become almost dependable in Yolo County from 2000 to 2003, has only put in a few brief appearances since.

As expected, migrant songbird reports slowed down from the highs of August and September, but there were still several interesting finds. A Blackpoll Warbler was reported from the Tall Forest at Cosumnes River Preserve (CRP) on 10/7. Also reported on 10/7 was a Blackpoll Warbler along Babel Slough and an Eastern Phoebe from UC Davis. Decent numbers of Townsend's Warblers, Black-throated Gray Warblers, and Western Tanagers continued through the month. A Hammond's Flycatcher and a Brown Creeper were found at CRP on 10/15, and another Brown Creeper was found at CRP on 10/22. Single **Evening** Grosbeaks were reported at Slide Hill Park in Davis on 10/11 and at CRP on 10/22.

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An early morning at the Howard Ranch on 10/18, private land in southeastern Sacramento County, produced a **Northern Pygmy-Ow**I, 5 **Burrowing Owls**, 12 **Common Poorwills**, 15 **Phainopeplas**, and 4 **Lawrence's Goldfinches**. Evening trips produced **Common Poorwills** and **Burrowing Owls** along Michigan Bar Rd, with the latter species also found along Meiss Rd. While

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rare but regular at the Howard Ranch in winter, **Burrowing Owls** had not been previously recorded along Michigan Bar and Meiss Rds. These probably represent fall dispersals rather than year-round residents.

Other interesting reports include a **Common** Loon near the Gristmill Access to the American River from 10/28 to 11/10, and continuing Chestnut-backed Chickadees from Putah Creek, UC Davis, and Willowbank Ditch. On 10/11, there were late reports of a Western Kingbird in Winters and a Bullock's Oriole near Davis. Hairy Woodpeckers were reported several times near Lake Solano, and more surprisingly, from the Putah Creek Sinks on 10/18. A Long-eared Owl was found roosting at a Sacramento County operations yard on Bradshaw Ave. from 10/10 to 10/12. A male Costa's Hummingbird was found in a Sacramento backyard sporadically from early August to 10/9.
