## Bobelaine Happenings

On October 31st we enjoyed participating in a scheduled walk at the sanctuary led by Carla Barbaro. Eighteen people had an enjoyable walk through part of the sanctuary. The weather was beautiful and sunny with a light breeze. The rains have caused a low growth of new grasses to sprout giving the trails a lush green look. The leaves are falling fast and by the time you read this most of them should be off the trees. This will make bird watching a bit easier and give you a better chance to see our resident Great Horned Owls as well as the other winged inhabitants.

A point of information for those who take children through the sanctuary during the winter. Poison Oak is very prevalent at the edge of the trails. It is very hard to define without it's leaves. If you think you have gotten into it wash your hands in cold water when you return to the parking lot. Then wash with soap and cold water as soon as possible. Poison Oak is one of our prettier plants during the fall when it's leaves turn a bright red before dropping off. Enjoy it at a distance.

### Field Trip Findings

Old Fair Oaks Bridge (11/16) Jack Hiehle said he has led 28-30 field trips annually in the last 15 years and had never seen a Bald Eagle on the American River Parkway – until this one. His group discovered the adult bird perched in a cottonwood in the Lower Sunrise area. Then it flew off, probably hunting for a spawned-out salmon. Jack reported 45 other species, including Pine Siskin and Lark Sparrow.

Latrobe, Scott Road, Bass L:ake (11/14) Leader Bruce Swinehart's group of 16 turned up 52 species on a day graced by perfect weather – not too cold, not too sunny and not windy. Standout sightings included a Rough-legged Hawk, Prairie Falcon, about 10 Rock Wrens at one time, and numerous Say's and Black Phoebes.

**Cal Expo Floodplain-Bushy Lake** (11/13) Leader Joe Ceriano's group recorded 55 species, including close looks at Western Bluebirds, Nuttall's Woodpeckers, and a Red-tailed Hawk that circled low.

Sacramento National Wildlife Area (11-7) Leader Andi Salmi reported: Our group of around 20 enjoyed viewing flocks of Greater White-fronted, Snow and Ross's Geese, many species of duck including Pintail, American and Eurasian Wigeon, Northern Shoveler, Mallard, Gadwall, Cinnamon Teal and Bufflehead. Also, a very close fly-by of a Barn Owl and an exciting view of a young Peregrine Falcon flying repeatedly through a flock of ducks. We had a lovely, sunny day.

**Bodega Bay** (11/6) - Highlights were two Hooded Mergansers, two Red-necked Grebes, two Red Knots, eight gull species,

Findings continued from page 1 an Elegant Tern and a flock of 85 Surfbirds on the mudflats. Leader Dan Brown said he had never seen so many Surfbirds, especially on the mudflats, and wondered if they were a migrating flock.

William Pond Area, American River Parkway (11/1) – Leader Jack Hiehle's trip offered plenty of variety: 47 birds, including a pair of Buffleheads, Fox Sparrow, Western Bluebirds and Wood Ducks; a River Otter, a Pond Turtle, salmon swimming upriver, suckers and Sacramento Pikeminnows (formerly squawfish).

**Bobelaine Sanctuary** (10/31) – Hairy, Downy and Nuttall's Woodpeckers showed off, along with a female Western Tanager, Wrentit, Sharp-shinned Hawk, and Western Bluebirds, among others. Leader Carla Barbaro said colors of the sycamores, maples and wild grapes were gorgeous.

**Discovery Park** (10/30) – A pair of Orangecrowned Warblers playing tag above vivid fall colors led a list of 32 species, leader Joe Ceriano, subbing for Maureen Geiger, reported. Ruby-crowned Kinglets were active.

Golden Gate Park, San Francisco (10/24) Maureen Geiger, reporting for leader Marilyn Hemmeter: It was a great trip! Seven of us birded the Stowe Lake area of Golden Gate Park and Cliff House and saw about 55 species. Best mammal was a Humpback Whale we watched off and on for about 45 minutes at the Cliff House. Best bird was a Hermit Warbler seen well. Other highlights included a Great Horned Owl, a Mew Gull and lots of Fox Sparrows, Pygmy Nuthatches and Townsend's Warblers.

**Coloma Area** (10/23) – Birders ignored rain sprinkles and recorded White-tailed Kite, Red-shouldered Hawk, and California Quail, among others, at this new area near the South Fork of the American River, leader Valerie Phillips reported.

Calaveras Big Trees State Park (10-17) "A small but hardy group walked the north grove in the rain. Birds were few," leader Cathie LaZier reported, "but a Fox Sparrow was picking Yew berries and a very wet accipiter perched high in a conifer. The Dogwood color was splendid. Gary Fregien remarked that the diffuse light brought out more of the color shadings than direct sun. As the rain increased, lunch at a local restaurant replaced the picnic in the meadow, and an early start home allowed a detour on Michigan Bar Road to add a Say's Phoebe and a Lewis's Woodpecker to the day's list."

#### Seasonal Observations

## October 1 to October 31 Rare and Unusual Bird Reports 783-2331

While last month was characterized by excellent fall migrants, this October featured an influx of semi-irruptive montane birds and scattered reports of unexpected migrants. For the first time since the fall of 2000, Pine Siskins were widely distributed in small numbers throughout the area. In the last two years they have been particularly difficult to find. Red-breasted Nuthatches continued in impressive numbers through the first half of the month, but then reports tapered off dramatically. A Steller's Jay was found near Winters in Yolo County on 10/27. Two Steller's Jays were reported at the Howard Ranch on 10/31, along with six Bandtailed Pigeons, two Bald Eagles, and four **Common Ravens.** 

Vagrant songbirds included a **Blackpoll Warbler** found at the Pedrick Rd. Bridge on both the Yolo and Solano County sides of Putah Creek on 10/1 and 10/2. The **Chestnut-sided Warbler** found on 9/28 at the Gristmill Access to the American River Parkway (ARP) continued through 10/2. A first-year male **Vermilion Flycatcher** was a long-hoped-for first at the Cosumnes River Preserve (CRP) on 10/11. On 10/30, a **Palm Warbler** was reported at the north end of Vail Rd. in San Joaquin County. On the same day, just to the south at Staten Island, single **Chestnut-sided** and **Lapland Longspurs** were reported-the former, a first for the county.

What was certainly the same **Common Black-Hawk** that was present from 2/24 to 3/12 returned to Lake Lincoln in north Stockton on 10/1. After a month and a half without another solid report, it was seen by many on 11/17. This is the first record for Northern California. A **Common Tern** was

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seen and photographed at the Woodland Wastewater Treatment Plant on 10/6. Three Pacific Golden-Plovers were reported from the same location on 10/8. Two Pacific Golden-Plovers were also present at the Lodi Sewage Ponds throughout the month. On 10/24, a Marbled Godwit and three Greater Scaup were reported from the Davis Wetlands. A Least Bittern was reported from CRP on 10/9.

Other interesting birds include a **Common Grackle** at the Hwy 80 rest area near Vallejo on 10/10, a **Sage Thrasher** at Rancho Seco

Park from 10/9 to at least 10/13, and a male Costa's Hummingbird at a feeder in Citrus Heights on 10/11. At the Gristmill Access to ARP, a **Hammond's Flycatcher** was found on 10/13, a Lawrence's Goldfinch was found on 10/14, and a Merlin was found on 10/15. Over 100 Violet-green Swallows were seen at Upper Sunrise on 10/20, and a White-throated Sparrow was seen at Sailor Bar on 10/29. A dark **Merlin** was regularly reported from north Davis. The Brown Pelican, first found on 7/19 at Stone Lakes NWR, continued through at least 10/14. A Dark-eyed Junco that was either a Pink-sided Junco, or a hybrid with that race, was reported from CRP on 10/28. Finally, there were two mountain lion reports this month-one from North Davis Farms on 10/6, and another along Hwy 16 in Colusa County just north of the Yolo line.
