AMERICAN BIRDING ASSOCIATION YOUTH CAMP REGISTRATION IS OPEN AND SCHOLARSHIPS ARE AVAILABLE

Registration for 2016 ABA Young Birder Camps, held in Colorado and Delaware, is now open. They expect all programs to fill quickly, so if you are thinking of attending, reserve your spot now at events.aba.org/aba-young-birder-camps/.

Some scholarships are available as mentioned in last month's Observer. Applications and more information can be found at youngbirders.aba.org/scholarships. Applications for scholarships are open as of December 10, 2015. The American Birding Association provides scholarships to help young people, who are interested in birds, attend summer camps, workshops, training programs, conventions and other bird-related activities. The funds for their scholarships come primarily from donations from ABA members and donations from sponsors. More information and registration can be found at events.aba. org/aba-young-birder-camps/. THE CENTRAL VALLEY BIRD CLUB'S YOUTH BIRDING CAMP AND SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM.

The David Yee Scholarship Fund will provide annual scholarships to birding camps for young club members. Camps include the ABA camps but also camps closer to home in the Sierras, Seattle and Arizona. Both the selection criteria and award process will include elements directly related to birding. For all camps, the scholarship will pay for the cost of the registration for the youth participant while transportation will be the responsibility of the participant. Field Trip Findings

Flood and Waverly Roads (11/15) -Leader Linda Pittman reported: "After a morning of rain, two people joined me for a drive through the eastern San Joaquin County grasslands. Waverly road was muddy (Flood Rd is paved) and the wind a little chilly, but we found most of the expected species for November including three Ferruginous Hawks, Northern Harriers, Red-tailed Hawks, Prairie Falcon, American Kestrels, many Loggerhead Shrikes and a Burrowing Owl. Western Meadowlarks and Savannah Sparrows were especially abundant. We missed eagles, Rough-legged Hawk and Shorteared Owls."

Putah Creek Riparian Reserve (11/11) — Maureen Geiger reported: "Bill Bianco was scheduled to lead the trip today but was sick, so I filled in for him. Five of us saw almost 40 species on a cold, clear morning. Best of trip were two Great Horned Owls that flushed right in front of us, so we all had very nice looks. Other than that, there were the usual suspects, with huge numbers of Yellow-rumped Warblers and American Robins dominating. An Orange-crowned Warbler was nice to see."

Mather Regional Park (10/31) — Leader Wayne Blunk reported: "Gorgeous weather greeted 13 birders for a morning of birding. Winter ducks had not arrived but

32 species were spotted. The usual cast of birds was sighted so the highlight was observing territorial behavior between two Mute Swan families."

Cosumnes River Preserve (10/30) — Leader Cathie LaZier reported: "Eight people joined me at the CRP for a walk along the flooded wetland ponds. We had a wide variety of duck species, and Larry Hickey pointed out 3 Blue-winged Teal males. We saw a few Sandhill Cranes, and had great scope looks at a Wilson's Snipe. The new viewing area at the end of the boardwalk provided excellent looks at Least Sandpipers, dowitchers, dunlin and pipits."

Colusa National Wildlife Refuge (10/27) Leader Dan Tankersley reported: "Ten of us enjoyed a full morning in the field at the Colusa National Wildlife Refuge. An overcast sky provided a few welcome drops of rain, and the temperature was a cool 61 degrees. Though the waterfowl species count was limited at this early date, there were thousands of Greater White-fronted Geese including a few Tule Geese. The predominant duck species was Northern Pintail with Mallard and Gadwall vying for a distant second place. In all there were four goose and eleven duck species seen. Our group recorded a very respectful total of 72 species observed from the observation deck, the riparian trail and the auto tour loop."

Bodega Bay (10/25) - Scott Hoppe, co-leader with Mark Martucci, reported: "It was a beautiful day for 20 birders at this world class birding destination. We tallied 89 species (thanks go to Ed Harper for keeping track). While we missed a couple of rare birds that had been sighted during the previous several days, we were lucky enough to get great views of a White-throated Sparrow, and a Tropical Kingbird. Out on Bodega Head, while scoping the off-shore waters, first a few and then hundreds of Black-vented Shearwaters appeared. We also had Surfbirds and Black Turnstones below us on the rocks. One of the biggest highlights was having 9-year-old Logan along. He decided he wanted to come on this birding trip for his birthday."

Effie Yeaw Nature Center (10/19) — Leader Bob McCleary reported: "Twelve enthusiastic birders joined the trip today. Highlights included a really great look at a Merlin, Cedar Waxwings, male Phainopepla, Red-tailed and Red-Shouldered Hawks, Green Herons, Osprey, resident Acorn Woodpeckers, and Nuttall's Woodpecker. Overall, a very good day."

BIRDS OF WINTER IN THE SACRAMENTO VALLEY

Again in 2016, **Ed Harper**, long time educator, tour guide, and noted birder of the Sacramento area, will help you learn the finer points of identification, natural history, and calls of the many species of birds resident in winter throughout the Sacramento region. By way of a series of lectures with beautiful photography and field trips, both beginning and experienced birders can improve their knowledge and skills.

Whereas some species of birds such as swallows, flycatchers, and warblers do migrate south for the winter, many more birds flock to the Sacramento region to spend the winter. Cranes, ducks, geese, gulls, raptors, kinglets, and sparrows are just a few of the many representative groups found during this exciting season. Whether you simply want to distinguish one sparrow species from another or seek help in learning the distinctive "chuck" note of a Hermit

Thrush, this course has broad appeal. Anyone who has a serious interest in birds and enjoys their presence in our world can profit from this class.

Suggested materials include **binoculars** and a recent field guide to the birds such as *The Sibley Guide to Birds* (2nd printing) or the National Geographic Society's *Field Guide to Birds of North America* (6th edition).

NOTE: A moderate amount of walking will be required for most trips requiring appropriate footwear and clothing. Liquids, insect repellant, sunscreen, and snack food can make your outings much more pleasant.

This beautiful 7,000-acre property owned by Audubon California is currently open to the public only for docent-led trips. Join Maureen and Valerie, Conservation Project Director (or the new Ranch Manager) for a rare opportunity to experience this unique property. On the hike through the blue oak woodlands, they will be looking for local and migrant bird species (which may include Golden Eagles, Lark Sparrows and Lewis's Woodpeckers). We will also learn about the restoration efforts taking place and effects of the recent, nearby fire. Clear weather will give us fabulous views of the valley. This outing involves moderate hiking on fairly level ground and should last until lunch time. Bring liquids; a picnic lunch at the Ranch is possible or a return to Winters where there are several good restaurants. There are restrooms at the meeting site. Meet at the Park and Ride in West Sacramento for a 7:30 departure. Alternate meeting place is the parking lot next to Steady Eddy's at 5 E. Main Street (intersection of Main and Railroad) in Winters by 8am. To reach the Park and Ride, from I-80, take the West Capitol Avenue exit, turn left at the light and left into the lot.

Herring, Thayer's, Glaucous-winged, California, Ring-billed and Mew Gulls are all possibilities. Spotting scopes will be very useful, and be sure to bring your field guides for this intensive study. We will be exploring some popular birding spots around San Francisco Bay. Possible destinations include Arrowhead Marsh, Hayward Shoreline and, time permitting, Palo Alto Baylands. The Bay has a lot to offer in terms of diversity of shorebirds and waterfowl, and Scott will be watching posts and checking conditions to choose the best locations. Bring lunch, liquids and dress for possible cooler Bay Area weather. Meet at the Park and Ride in West Sacramento. From Sacramento, take the West Capitol Ave Exit #81; turn left at the light and then

left again into the Park and Ride lot. Rain cancels the trip.

Bring liquids, lunch, warm clothes, spotting scopes, and FRS radios if possible. Meet at the Mace Blvd Park and Ride, From Sacramento, take I-80 west towards Davis to Mace Blvd (Exit #75): turn right (north) and then right again at the signal light to the Park and Ride entrance a short distance beyond Ikeda's Market. We will meet on the south side of the parking lot in the row nearest the big round water tank. Heavy rain or high winds cancel the trip.

Many birders find identification of gulls to be fairly daunting. Curlews, other shorebirds, and ducks are also possible. Meet at the Mace Blvd Park and Ride at 9am. From Sacramento, take I-80 to west to Mace Blvd (Exit #75); turn right (north) and then

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right again to the Park and Ride behind Ikeda's Market. From there we will proceed to the best place from which to view the gulls.

This is a very pretty area and a great place for a morning bird outing. Trip will end by 11am. Bring water and dress for cold weather. We can handle a sprinkle, but heavy rain cancels trip.

Meet Cathie along the first parking area just past the entrance kiosk. We'll walk down to some different spots on the river, where mergansers and goldeneye can be found in the backwaters and wrens and towhees call from the bushes. California Quail, Western Bluebirds and Lark Sparrows may be found in the park area. Trip will end before noon. A Sac County Park Pass or \$5 entry fee is required for all vehicles. From the intersection of Fair Oaks and Arden, follow Arden east and it runs into the park. This is an excellent trip for beginners

Tim and Ann will be looking for the enormous flocks of ducks, geese and swans that winter in the valley or stop to feed on their way south. This is also a good place for raptors, and Bald Eagles can be found here regularly. There is a 3.7 mile driving route and a great viewing platform as well. This trip will last into early afternoon and Tim and Ann are planning a stop at the Willows deli for lunch. FRS radios are helpful on this trip. Meet at the Bel Air shopping center on Arena Blvd. From Sacramento, take I-5 north to Arena Blvd, go west (left) over the freeway. Take the first left, Duckhorn Rd, and then turn right into the parking area. We will meet on the north side of the parking lot between Wells Fargo and Golden 1. Please note there is a \$6 day use fee for each vehicle at the refuge, or buy a Duck Stamp and support all our national refuges . This is a good trip for newer birders and experienced birders alike.

Join Tim for an easy walk of about a mile and a half, viewing the wintering waterfowl, egrets, herons and shorebirds in the flooded wetland ponds, and listening for the unique call of the Sandhill Cranes as they soar overhead. CRP scopes will be available for close looks at a variety of birds, as well as microscopes to see the little critters that live in these ponds. This is an excellent walk for beginning birders, both adults and young people. Meet at the CRP Visitor Center parking lot. Bring water and snacks and dress for changeable weather. From Sacramento, take I-5 south to Twin Cities Road; go left (east) to the stop sign at Franklin Blvd; turn right (south) on Franklin and, driving through the Preserve, watch for the Visitor Center parking lot on your left. This is the prime time to see our Sandhill

Cranes. They, as well as a variety of ducks, swans, geese, and shorebirds, feed in the flooded fields and marshy areas of the delta, and hawks patrol overhead. Meet at the Cosumnes River Preserve Visitor Center deck at 3:30pm to hear a brief presentation of Sandhill Crane behavior, biology and status. Then we'll stroll the boardwalk enjoying views of the cranes, wintering waterfowl and shorebirds. Afterwards, we'll drive along Desmond Road and possibly to Woodbridge Road or Staten Island, to see flocks of cranes fly in to roost for the night. Dress for changeable weather and bring binoculars. Scopes are helpful. See directions for December 26 day trip.

Start the New Year off right; go birding! Wintering Sandhill Cranes, Greater White-fronted Geese and a wide variety of duck species frequent the preserve. Yellowlegs and Wilson's Snipe will be in the shallower water, and other shorebirds are possible. Tim will walk along the wetland ponds, stopping at the "Ducks In Scopes" activity

and then going out to the renovated boardwalk viewing area. Meet at the CRP Visitor Center parking lot. Bring water and snacks and dress for changeable weather. This is an enjoyable trip for everyone, and beginners and families are welcome. See directions for the December 26th trip.

Join Pam and Daniel for a tour of this prime wintering area for ducks and geese. After Gray Lodge, they'll take the route back around the west side of the Sutter Buttes, looking for Sandhill Cranes, raptors and grassland birds, and then stop at the Colusa NWR viewing platform. Bring lunch, liquids, and warm clothing. FRS radios and scopes are helpful if you have

them. Meet in the Bel Air shopping center on Arena Blvd. From Sacramento, take I-5 north to Arena Blvd, go west (left) over the freeway. Take the first left, Duckhorn Rd, and then turn right into the parking area. We will meet on the north side of the parking lot between Wells Fargo and Golden 1. There is a \$4.32 per person charge at Gray Lodge, and it's wise to bring the exact amount for the Iron Ranger.

Mather Lake is one of our most popular birding locations, with quite a list of bird species. Join Mark to look for a nice variety of resident and migrant birds. Possibilities include White-tailed Kites, American Bittern, Green Heron, Pied-billed Grebe and Common Yellowthroat. If you bring your camera Mark may give you some photography tips as well. Meet in the parking lot of Mather Regional Park; from Highway 50, go south on Zinfandel about 2-1/2 miles. After crossing Douglas Blvd. take the first left into the park area. There is a \$5 per car entrance fee; your Sac County Parkway pass is valid here. This is a wonderful trip for beginning birders.

Wednesday, January 6, 8am Colusa National Wildlife Refuge Leader: Dan Tankersley, 662-1290 dtankers@winfirst.com

The Colusa NWR is a great location to view large waterfowl concentrations. There will be many duck species and plenty of Snow, Ross's, Greater White-fronted and possibly a few Cackling Geese as well as other wetland birds. Eurasian Wigeon is often seen here as well, and we can expect many raptors with the possibility of Bald Eagle and Peregrine Falcon. We will spend a good amount of time on the viewing platform, and then take an easy walk on a level trail through riparian habitat next to the main viewing pond. We will then take the short auto tour to finish our outing to this wonderful NWR. Be prepared for cold and damp weather. Weather permitting, there should be ample photo ops. Scopes and FRS radios will be helpful on this trip. Meet Dan at the Mace Blvd Park and Ride. From Sacramento, take I-80 west towards Davis to Mace Blvd (Exit #75); turn right

(north) and then right again at the signal light to the Park and Ride entrance a short distance beyond Ikeda's Market. We will meet on the south side of the parking lot in the row nearest the big round water tank. Rain, strong wind, or thick fog cancels. Bring snacks and liquids as the trip will end in the very late morning to very early afternoon.

Join Gary on a trip featuring the waters and back-country roads of the Sierra foothills in western Amador County. There is a surprising variety and number of passerines and raptors in this area, with a possibility of Lewis's Woodpeckers, Hermit and Varied Thrushes, sparrows, Prairie Falcons and Ferruginous Hawks. This trip also includes stops for waterfowl and shorebirds at ponds near Sutter Creek and Ione. We may also stop at Lake Comanche, where a day-use fee is charged. There will be minimal hiking, but dress for winter conditions. Bring along hand held radios if you have them, food and water. Meet Gary at the Local Bean Cafe in the Rancho Murieta shopping center. Turn right at the 1st traffic light; junction of Hwy 16 (Jackson Rd) and Murieta Drive, and right again just past the fire station.

Sunday, January 10, 8am Wintering Raptors in the Central Valley Leader: Craig Swolgaard, 530-334-3023, cswol@sbcglobal.net

This day will focus on wintering raptors. A published study found that California's Central Valley is one of the richest wintering areas for raptors in the country. The trip will begin at Meiss and Dillard Roads and end at Clay Station and Dillard Roads following a 33 mile loop used as a survey route in a past study. Many species of raptors have been found along this productive drive during the winter months, including Golden Eagle, Ferruginous and Roughlegged Hawks, White-tailed Kite, Prairie Falcon, Merlin, and Burrowing Owl. This is

also a good area to find Mountain Bluebirds in winter and has potential for other vagrants. Meet Craig at the small public parking lot on Highway 16 and Sunrise Blvd. at 8am. We will car pool to try and keep the car numbers down, as some of the route uses pullouts on a busy highway. Bring a spotting scope if possible. Trip may go into early afternoon so water and food may be a good idea.

The variety of habitats in this area; lake, riparian forest, and chaparral, are good for wintering birds, and those that have moved down-slope. Some possibilities are Steller's Jay, Red-breasted Nuthatch, Winter Wren, Mountain Quail, Golden-crowned Kinglet, California Thrasher, Mountain Bluebird, Band-tailed Pigeon, eagles and Osprey. The wildcard will be the weather. A lot of rain will make the creek a raging torrent, and the walk down to the lake could be muddy, so dress accordingly. Meet Craig at the Bella Bru in the El Dorado Hills shopping center. From Hwy 50 east take Exit #30B; turn right on El Dorado Hills Blvd and go north under the freeway to the shopping center on your right. Rain on the trip day cancels.

Saturday, January 16, 8am Sacramento National Wild Life Refuge Leader: John York, 409-9276 Johnyork157@yahoo.com

First stop will be Colusa Wildlife Refuge, checking out the viewing platform, (restrooms available), and then on to SNWR. John will be looking for the great flocks of ducks and geese that winter in the valley. Peregrine Falcons and Bald Eagles are sometimes seen, as well as herons, egrets and bitterns. There is a 3.7 mile driving route and a great viewing platform as well. This trip will last into early afternoon, so bring lunch, drinks and warm clothes. Note there is a fee for each vehicle at the SNWR refuge: either \$6 for a day pass or a \$12 Refuge Annual Pass, or buy a Duck Stamp and support all our national refuges. Meet at the Bel Air shopping center on Arena Blvd. From Sacramento, take I-5 north to Arena Blvd, go west (left) over the freeway. Take the first left, Duckhorn Rd, and then turn right into the parking area. We will meet on the north side of the parking lot between Wells Fargo and Golden 1.

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Saturday, January 16, 10:30am Effie Yeaw Family Nature Walk

This family friendly nature walk will be at the Effie Yeaw Nature Center in Carmichael. Reservations are not needed, families can simply show up and enjoy a one-hour walk in the lovely Nature Area with naturalists/birders who know the area and enjoy sharing their knowledge. This is a great area for wintering Ferruginous and Rough-legged Hawks, Prairie Falcons, Merlins, curlews, possible Mountain Plovers, shrikes, and other interesting birds. Bring liquids, lunch, warm clothes, spotting scopes, and FRS radios if possible. Meet at the Mace Blvd Park and Ride. From Sacramento, take I-80 west towards Davis to Mace Blvd (Exit #75); turn right (north) and then right again at the signal light to the Park and Ride entrance a short distance beyond Ikeda's Market. We will meet on the south side of the parking lot in the row nearest the big round water tank. Heavy rain or high winds cancel the trip.

SACRAMENTO CITY COLLEGE INTRODUCTION TO ORNITHOLOGY

Sacramento City College will be offering its Introduction to Ornithology class during its spring 2016 semester. It is tentatively scheduled from 4-4:50 on Tuesdays and 6-9pm on Thursdays for labs. There will be weekend field trips. Keep an eye out for the official schedule at losrios.edu/scc/spring/Biology-BIOL.htm.

The class is listed as BIOL 332 Introduction to Ornithology, 3 Units

Description: This introductory course covers the biology and natural history of birds. Topics include the evolutionary origins of birds and flight, avian physiology and sensory systems, migration, social behavior, reproduction, and conservation. Laboratory work explores bird structure and function and teaches the taxonomic classification and identification of birds, particularly those found in California and the western United States. Field trips are required; students study bird identification, behavior, and ecology.

There is a TBA LAB which is the field trip component of the class. One weekend field trip, four Saturday or Sunday field trips and one weekday field trip to observe bird banding are also required.

DUCKS (AND MORE) IN SCOPES

A great trip for families, youth groups and newer birders, this is an opportunity to work on duck identification as well as other wetland birds.

Stop by the Cosumnes River Preserve and check out Ducks In Scopes, where docents have a row of scopes set up, including lower ones for children, giving you good views of the many colorful ducks and other wetland birds. A microscope and hand lens provide close-up looks at 'Duck Soup', dishes of water dipped from the pond full of sand fleas, dragonfly nymphs, and other squiggly things that provide the protein the birds are feeding on. The Preserve is a quick drive from Sacramento-south on I-5 to Twin Cities Road; left (east) on Twin Cities for 1 mile; then right (south) on Franklin Blvd. The viewing area is in the first parking lot on your right as you drive into the preserve. Come any time between 10am and 2pm, on the following dates:

December: Sunday 12/6 and Saturdays 12/12, 12/19 and 12/26

Then, start the New Year off right and join us on Friday, January 1, 2016.

Greetings from the Great Backyard Bird Count team at Audubon, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, and Bird Studies Canada! We want to remind you to mark your calendars for the 19th GBBC, coming up February 12 through 15, 2016. Because the GBBC is integrated with the eBird program you can start practicing now at ebird.org. Count statistics from all over the world generate much needed information for scientists about bird populations and movements. Last year a total of 18,726,079 birds were counted worldwide. The birdcount.org site also contains a gallery of participants' bird photography including contest winners and category itemization by criteria such as behavior and habitat.

Now there are dedicated GBBC apps for android and iOS platforms. The BirdLog app from BirdsEye is the exclusive mobile data entry app for the Great Backyard Bird Count that allows you to:

- Plot the exact location of your sightings using your phone's GPS
- Easy 1 tap to increment species counts
- Create new personal locations or choose an existing hotspot or personal location for your checklist
- Create checklists even when there is no cell coverage for later submission
- Enter birds quickly and easily as you see them using bird codes or full names
- Scroll and review your checklist before submitting it

SALVAGING RAPTOR CARCASSES FOR EVALUATION

The Wildlife Investigations Lab (WIL) and the Wildlife Branch of CDFW are requesting raptor carcasses be collected and submitted to WIL, including eagles. The carcasses will be used for mortality investigation to inform a disease and contaminate surveillance project for which WIL is lead. In addition, the carcasses can be used to improve avian influenza detection in non-waterfowl species and to better understand impacts to raptors; also to inform future conservation and management actionsfor raptors.

Ideally, carcasses should be dead less than 24-48 hours and have no signs of scavenging or insect infestation, and under most conditions carcasses can be frozen until submission. Please contact Krysta Rogers for further information.

Seasonal Observations

October 1 to October 31 Rare and Unusual Bird Reports www.cvbirds.org/ListServ.htm

This month was modestly slow in the scheme of things and can't really be characterized, like some months can, as an invasion year of montane birds or one with a lot of rarities. Waterfowl numbers continued to build, **Ferruginous Hawks** and **Merlins** and other winter raptors increased in abundance, and some of the most interesting reports were of birds that lingered from September. The only **Pectoral Sandpiper** report of the month was from the Davis Wetlands on 10/5, while a single **Rednecked Phalarope** continued through the end of the month at the Woodland WTP.

Unlike the past fall/winter period, there were few reports of **Band-tailed Pigeons** away from typical sites on the west side of the Valley, where over 50 were reported in the Putah Creek canyon on 10/17. A **Common**

Poorwill found along Latrobe Rd in eastern Sacramento County on 10/24 was later than most. A **Red-naped Sapsucker** was photographed at Lake Solano County Park on 10/3.

Among songbirds, a Western Kingbird was reported along Babel Slough on the surprisingly late date of 10/8. There doesn't appear to be a repeat of last winter's Steller's Jay invasion, though singles from Fair Oaks on 10/21-22 and another Fair Oaks site on 10/31 were notable. A Sage Thrasher along Michigan Bar Rd first reported on 10/8 continued to at least 10/15 and was seen and photographed by several observers. A Tennessee Warbler found at Ancil Hoffman Park on 10/7 was probably the same bird found there on 9/30. A Black-and-white Warbler first reported at the UC Davis Arboretum on 9/29 continued through at least 10/1. while a late Wilson's Warbler was found in Davis on 10/25. The Black-chinned

Sparrow first found along Babel Slough on 9/30 was reported through 10/19. An impressive 9 Vesper Sparrows were at "Vesper Sparrow Corner" on Hwy 128, the first bend west of Winters, on 10/17. A female Cassin's Finch was a nice surprise among Purple Finches at Fiske Lake in the mountains of northwest Yolo County. A flock of Red Crossbills were reported north of the American River near Hazel Ave on 10/30, and Evening Grosbeak reports included one from along Putah Creek near Pedrick Rd on 10/8, one at Effie Yeaw on 10/17, and four in Fair Oaks on 10/30. Missing from last month's report was a female Painted Bunting seen and photographed at the Ione WTP on 9/12.
