Field Trip Findings

Coordinator Jack Hiehle said the total

was just two shy of the record. While no

new birds were found, a Rough-legged

Hawk was reported for only the second

time, and a Bald Eagle for the fourth

time. Eighty-one Wild Turkeys were

found. Observers counted 11 mammals,

including a three-legged deer in Ancil

Lincoln Grasslands (12/12) – Despite the fog, it was a "raptorous" day for leader Tim Fitzer's group. He reported: Merlin, Prairie Falcon, Ferruginous Hawk, Barn Owl and two Great-horned Owls.

Lincoln Hills (12/11) – Highlights included a close-up view of a Barn Owl out in the open, near tules, along with a look at Downy and Nuttall's Woodpeckers and a White-breasted Nuthatch coexisting on one tree. Leader Dave Pearson also reported: Green-winged and Cinnamon Teals, American Bittern and a bevy of sparrows including Lincoln's, Rufouscrowned, Savannah, White-crowned, and Golden-crowned.

Sonoma/Marin Counties (12/5) Spotting a Clapper Rail is always a treat but how about six of them? They're reported in decline in California because of red fox depredations, but leader Ron Storey's crew found six at Corte Madera Marsh. "We saw Clapper Rail walk on the bank of a slough right out in the open; we saw Clapper Rail swim and fly," said Ron, who was joined by his wife Phyllis, as co-leader. Other notables: several Blue-winged Teal and Thayer's Gull at Shollenberger Park: and Green-winged Teal at Corte Madera Marsh. Also: four River Otter swimming and then crossing the trail not far in front of the group at Las Galinas Pond.

American River Parkway (12/4) – Forty observers, most of them Sacramento Auduboners, recorded 108 bird species in the 20th annual American River Natural History Association's Winter Wildlife Count on the parkway.

Hoffman Park that seemed unbothered by its limitation. Jack said it was believed to have been the same animal that was seen recently in Goethe Park and likely swam across the river. Overall, 91 deer were reported, including 48 in Ancil Hoffman Park. Nimbus Fish Hatchery (12/4) – Leader Frank Gray provided a gull clinic for his group, which found Thayer's, Mew,

his group, which found Thayer's, Mew, Glaucous-winged, California, Ring-billed and Herring species. Also, a Spotted Sandpiper was present.

Nimbus Fish Hatchery (12/1) – A Barrow's Goldeneye, Phainopepla, Cooper's Hawk and Hermit Thrush topped the list of 49 species reported by leader Jack Hiehle. They also saw 14 Ring-necked Pheasants.

Woodbridge Regional Park (11/28) Alas, the Vermillion Flycatcher that has visited Turner Road Vintners for the second straight winter, failed to show up. But despite an icy wind, four intrepid birders led by Maureen Geiger found 56 other species, including Downy Woodpecker, Cooper's Hawk and Hermit Thrush.

Central Valley Birding Symposium, Stockton (11/18-21) – Standouts included Eastern Phoebe and Swamp Sparrow at the Cosumnes River Preserve (CRP); Surf Scoter, Stockton Deep Water Channel, and the Vermillion Flycatcher at Turner Road Vintners. But Kurt Mize, field trips coordinator, said the best bird was a Common Black Hawk seen in Stockton the day before the symposium but not during the event. It was a first for northern California, a third for all California. Other nice birds among 179 reported: Mew Gull, Nimbus Fish Hatchery; Blue-winged Teal, CRP; Eurasian Wigeon, Gray Lodge and Yolo County; Pacific Golden-Plover, Modesto Sewer Ponds; Thayer's and Glaucouswinged gulls, O'Neil Forebay, and American Dipper, New Hogan Reservoir. Best Performance Award: a Merlin that rose from a fence post and nailed a passing LBJ in front of viewers in East San Joaquin County.

Special Note - Veteran Audubon trip leader Chris Conard reported watching a kit fox and badger go eyeball-toeyeball on a recent extended weekend getaway to Carrizo Plain National Monument, grassland/desert prairie west of Buttonwillow on Highway 58. Through a scope, Chris and his wife Kimva watched one of two foxes stick its nose into a hole and moments later a badger popped out. "They had a brief standoff, then the badger proceeded to scratch and groom," Chris said. "After several minutes it lay on its belly, staring us down." Chris had never seen the San Joaquin Valley race of Kit Fox, which is on the U.S. Endangered Species list. "We were amazed at our good fortune," he said.

WANTED: BANDED BURROWING OWLS

Audubon members and birders can contribute to the scientific knowledge and conservation of burrowing owls. In the summer of 2004, 6,000 burrowing owls were banded in the United States, Canada, and Mexico, including California. Each owl is wearing a color metal band on one leg and an aluminum U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service band on the other leg. Every color band has an alpha-numeric code which can be difficult to read, but it is possible with a spotting scope. If you see a

banded owl, please record the color of the band, the code, whether there is a line in the middle of the band, and which leg the color band is on.

Burrowing owls have been found wintering from the state of Washington to Texas and Mexico. According to Helen

Trefry, a banded burrowing owl from Lubbock, Texas was found in Michoacan,

Mexico and another from Saskatchewan wintered in south Texas. Burrowing owl researchers are requesting your help in locating more of these owls. If you locate a banded owl, please contact Helen Trefry as soon as possible. Even if you are not able to read the band yourself (someone else may be able to), please report your observation to Helen. Seasonal Observatíons

November 1 to November 30 Rare and Unusual Bird Reports 783-2331

Several of the more notable species found this month were observed during the Central Valley Birding Symposium from 11/19 through 11/21. Three of the most notable species continued to be found through press time and may winter at the sites described below. If only other rarities were so dependable.

An Eastern Phoebe* was a long-overdue first Sacramento County record. It was found just west of the Cosumnes River Preserve (CRP) visitor center, along Franklin Blvd, on 11/13 by a birder on his first visit to the Preserve! It has been seen and photographed by dozens, leaving few searchers disappointed. The first-winter male Vermilion Flycatcher* found last year on the Stockton CBC was refound this year during the Symposium, as a striking adult, at the Turner Rd Vintners just east of I-5. On 11/18, a Swamp Sparrow* was found along the River Walk at CRP just south of the junction with the visitor center bridge. It continues to be found by many observers, but not so dependably as the flycatchers. A second Swamp Sparrow* was reported from the Tall Forest on 11/19.

Another highlight of the Symposium, but only on 11/20, was a first-year male **Surf Scoter*** reported from the Deep Water Channel in Stockton. The returning **Common Black-Hawk**** was seen by several observers on 11/17 after a month and a half without a solid report. Unfortunately, this bird has not been reported again.

An extremely late **Ash-throated Flycatcher** (*seasonal rarity) was reported from the CSU Sacramento campus on 11/12. This species, indeed any in the genus Myiarchus, is very rare in Northern California in winter.

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Another out-of-season flycatcher report was of a **"Western" Flycatcher** (*seasonal rarity) from CRP on 11/23. It did not make a distinguishing vocalization, so it could not be assigned to species.

Notable waterbird reports include a late **Pectoral Sandpiper** from the auto tour loop at the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area (YBWA) on 11/13, a **Least Bittern** from CRP on the same late date, and multiple **Barrow's Goldeneye** reports from Putah Creek and the American River Parkway (ARP) beginning in the first week of the month. A **Common Loon** was found at Lake Solano from 11/5 through 11/11. Another **Common Loon** was reported from CRP, off of Desmond Rd, on

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Copy deadline is the 15th of the month. Send all copy to the Editor. Observations must reach the Seasonal Observations Editor by the 8th of the month.

The Observer is published monthly January through December, except June and August, by the Sacramento Audubon Society.

11/12. Horned Grebes were reported from the Davis Wetlands on 11/5, the Port of Sacramento on 11/23, and Sherman Island on 11/29.

An excellent list of birds was compiled at the Howard Ranch (private property in southeastern Sacramento County) on 11/7 which included 45 Band-tailed Pigeons, over 70 Lewis's Woodpeckers, one Hairy Woodpecker, one Vesper Sparrow, three Ferruginous Hawks and four Prairie Falcons. Other interesting reports this month include a first-year Harris's Sparrow* at Colusa NWR on 11/26 and continuing into early December, unusually numerous reports of Red Fox Sparrows (the eastern race) from CRP and ARP, and a Grasshopper **Sparrow** from YBWA parking lot B on 11/10 and continuing through at least 11/22. Bald Eagles were reported regularly throughout the month on the upper stretches of ARP. and one was reported from CRP on 11/28. Merlins were widely reported from CRP, ARP, and Davis. Pine Siskin reports continued to be regular throughout the region, though Red-breasted Nuthatch reports, exceptionally numerous in early fall, were relatively infrequent in November.

Documentation of species listed with an asterisk (*) should be submitted to the Sacramento Bird Records Committee. Species with a double asterisk (**) are on the California Bird Records Committee review list.
