Farallon Islands Boat Trip

SUNDAY, JULY 10, 2005

Journey west of the golden Gate to cruise around Southeast Farallon Island, one of San Francisco's "desert islands" and the crown jewel of the Point Reyes-Farallon Islands National Marine Sanctuary. Sacramento Audubon has chartered the cruise boat, "Salty Lady," out of Sausalito for the approximately eight hour trip.

This trip has produced something different for the last 15 years! Some years bring sightings of giant Leatherback Turtles, while other years squadrons of Dall's porpoise cavort along the boat's bow wave. Almost always the Tufted Puffin makes an appearance. Often Gray, Humpback, and occasionally Blue whales, have been sighted quite close to the boat.

What will alert observers find this year? Come join us and discover for yourself.

- The boat departs Sausalito at 8am and returns about 3:30pm
- The trip cost is \$75 per person, which includes a \$20 donation to Sacramento Audubon. The trip is limited to approximately 45 persons, so reserve space as soon as possible. The deadline is June 30.

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Field Trip Findings

William Pond Park (4/15) – Leader Jack Hiehle's group enjoyed fair weather while recording 48 species. They included lots of Western Kingbirds, Bullock's Oriole, a number of Wood Ducks, Chipping Sparrow, Cooper's Hawk, California Quail, and Cliff, Tree and Northern Rough-winged Swallows.

Shadow Glen/Snowberry Creek (4/10) – Leader Lea Landry reported: "Eighteen enthusiastic birders enjoyed a beautiful day on the Western States Trail out of the Snowberry Creek Staging Area in Orangevale. The trail was a bit muddy, so

our group used the shoulder of the American River Bike Trail at times. Sightings of about 30 species included lots of Yellow-rumped Warblers (Audubon's and Myrtles), Wilson's Warbler, Western Bluebirds, Tree and Rough-winged Swallows, and Rufous-crowned Sparrows.

A small group went on to White Rock and Prarie Citly Roads and were rewarded with wonderful looks at Lewis's Woodpeckers, Horned Larks and Savannhah Sparrows."

Jepson Prairie & Yolo Bypass (4/3) "Our small but enthusiastic group enjoyed a pleasant spring day viewing wildflowers, including goldfields, butter-and-eggs, white hyacinth and many species of grass," leader Andi Salmi reported. "The Yolo Wildlife Area was rich with ibis, Cinnamon and Green-winged Teal

and other ducks, Dunlin in early breeding plumage and very close views of several American Bitterns."

Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area (4/2) – Leader Maureen Geiger reported a great day at Sacramento city's backyard birding hot-spot: "Many raptors, shorebirds and ducks in addition to the usual resident birds," she said. "A Peregrine Falcon, Swainson's Hawks, many Green-winged Teal, a Whimbrel, and

a Marbled Godwit were highlights."

Bannister Park (4/1) – Some 15 Snow Egrets, apparently filling up on the abundance of fingerling salmon, featured leader Jack Hiehle's parkway walk. Other sightings included five nests of Great Blue Herons, Downy Woodpecker, Cooper's Hawk, Wild Turkey, and California Quail.

Effie Yeaw Nature Center (3/20) – "Cooper's and Red-shouldered hawks were active," Cathie LaZier reported. "We found Bushtit and Anna's Hummingbird nests. Hutton's Vireos, Ruby-

crowned Kinglets and Purple Finches were singing, and we enjoyed some wildflowers, including Giraffe's Heads and Tidy Tips."

Sacramento County Bufferlands (3/27) –
"Although high water limited our access and conditions were muddy, highlights included American White Pelicans, and nesting Great Blue Herons, Great Egrets and Double-crested Cormorants," leader Chris Conard said.
"There were numbers of waterfowl, including a few Canvasbacks and approximately 600 Ring-necked Ducks. A pair of courting Swainson's Hawks, a Great Horned Owl with nestlings, and lots of bird song made for a nice early spring day."

Petaluma & points west (3/19) – Leader Ron Storey's trip was rained out.

Sailor Bar (3/18) – Leader Jack Hiehle reported that Ring-necked Pheasant, American Wigeon, Barn Swallow, Green Heron and White-tailed Kite highlighted this walk on the parkway.

West Nile Concerns

Spring is here and after our very wet winter mosquitoes will definitely be a problem. Do all you can to make sure your yard and neighborhood is not habitat friendly for them by checking for standing water areas.

What to do if you notice dead birds that look suspicious: Contact your California Department of Health Services, California West Nile Virus Surveillance Information Center at 1-877-968-2473. Checkout their web site for pictures of the affected species, an online reporting system, as well as maps and data about confirmed WNV bird deaths in California at http://westnile.ca.gov/

Sunday, May 1, 7:30am Spenceville Wildlife Area Leader: Richard Barbieri, 966-4603 offleash@sbcglobal.net

This scenic recreational area of rolling hillsides, streams, reservoirs and ponds offers a variety of wildlife. This trip will include several short hikes and one optional 5 mile hike over uneven terrain. A short steep climb to Fairytale Falls may provide a look at a Dipper. Other possible birds include Yellow-breasted Chat, Lewis' Woodpecker, rails, warblers and more. Bring lunch, plenty of water, and dress for changeable weather. Meet Richard at Brookfield's restaurant in Roseville (NOT the Madison location). Take Eureka Road exit off I-80; go right on Eureka and then take the first left at the stoplight (Taylor Road). The restaurant is located behind the Shell gas station.

At this favorite spring hotspot you should find wildflowers in bloom and hear the song of the Yellow-breasted Chat. Richard will scout for Lazuli Buntings, Wrentits, California Thrashers, migrating humming-birds and colorful warblers. Meet Richard at the Bella Bru in the shopping center on the northeast corner of El Dorado Hills Blvd. and Highway 50. This will be a half-day trip.

This is a great area for nesting hummingbirds at this time of year. Tim will also look for Blue-gray Gnatcatchers, Lazuli Buntings, California Thrashers, Rufouscrowned Sparrows and possibly Yellowbreasted Chats. Wear your hiking boots for the 2 to 3 mile hike. Meet Tim in the shopping center parking lot next to the AM-PM on Douglas Blvd., just east of the intersection with Folsom-Auburn Road. Bring lunch and liquids, as this trip will continue into the early afternoon.

Meet Jack in Glen Hall Park at the end of Carlson Drive for this lovely morning hike along the American River. Jack will show his skills as an all-around naturalist by pointing out nesting birds, butterflies and wildflowers.

Join the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District (SRCSD) Bufferlands and the Stone Lakes National Wildlife Refuge for a Walk on the Wildside, a celebration of International Migratory Bird Day. Walk on the Wildside highlights local efforts to protect and restore Central Valley habitats. This free, family-oriented event includes tours, presentations, live animals, music, hands-on activities, informational exhibits, and more. Guided and self-guided tours are offered throughout the day. Explore a pristine valley oak riparian forest in search of migratory songbirds. Visit numerous wetland and riparian restoration projects. Enjoy a unique opportunity to see one of approximately four heron rookeries in Sacramento County on a Bufferlands guided tour. This rookery contains over 100 active nests of Great Blue Herons, Great Egrets, and Double-crested Cormorants.

Spotting scopes will be available for optimum viewing of these fascinating and beautiful birds.



Early summer weather provides an opportunity to see recently fledged young birds. Ash-throated Flycatcher, wrens, Western Bluebirds, kites and Red-shouldered Hawks are among the possibilities. We'll look for interest-

ing plants and wildflowers as well. The trip will last

approximately 3 hours and is a good choice for beginning birders. Meet in the first parking lot on the right, just

past the entrance kiosk on Rod Beaudry Drive. There is a \$4 entrance fee per car; if you want to carpool in meet Cathie on Rod Beaudry Drive just off Folsom Blvd. at 6:50am.

The Sudden Abundance of Painted Lady Butterflies

The winter rains that produced incredible wildflower displays in the southern deserts also led to a bumper crop of painted lady butterflies. First noted in exceptional numbers on Monday, 3/28, the butterflies were moving through our area in a northwestern direction at a rate of 100 or more per minute visible from a single point. They continued at a similar

volume for two weeks, and continue through press-time at perhaps five percent of their peak.

While the painted lady is a fairly common butterfly locally, this is the largest mass movement through our area that most observers can remember. Interestingly, the individuals we see currently will breed locally on mallows and thistles, and their offspring will continue north. The butterflies that winter in the desert are several generations removed from the

first wave heading north, so the migration is a multigenerational affair.

With a nearly worldwide distribution, the painted lady is one of the most common butterfly species—a fact made plain by this year's spectacle. On a drive from southern California, Ed Pandolfino noted the butterflies were abundant from

Los Angeles all the way to Sacramento. The sheer numbers that account for this mass movement are difficult to comprehend, but, like the stars, must figure in the billions.

Many in Sacramento Audubon have gone on Ed's tours of Montana and the Big Sky Country. His Montana roots run deep. Department of the Interior since 1977. Having grown up in the Bozeman area, Ed still spends extensive time there each year. Although now retired from teaching mathematics at American River College, Ed will always be the teacher and you can expect he will be sharing some of his insights about birds and the special places they can be found in Montana. It is an evening you won't want to miss!

The Sites of Spring, 2005

I hope many of you were able to take advantage of the web camera sites and other birding information offered last spring. We have two local nesting sites that have been very popular and are fully active at press time.

One is in Benicia and features the barn owl duo, Diego and Frieda. Last year they fledged 6 youngsters! Quite a surprise to those who follow owls. Frieda has again laid 7 eggs and 4 have hatched so far (as of April 17). This web cam can be viewed at night and there are actually two cameras so you can see two different angles. The address is www.theowlcam.com.

In San Francisco a pair of Peregrine falcons has been encouraged to nest on the 33rd floor of the PG&E building. This loving pair has been named George and Gracie. Last year was the first year they nested successfully and they fledged two young. This year they have four chicks, all of which hatched the week of April 10. Also on the web site are a nesting diary and good photos of courting activity. If you have a high speed connection you can actually watch the young being fed since the images change every 2 seconds. 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Seasonal Observations

March 1 to March 31
Rare and Unusual Bird Reports

After a wet winter, many observers noted

excellent floral displays, providing a great back-drop for any local outdoor adventure. During the last week of the month, an unfathomable number of painted lady butterflies migrated to and through our area from the southern deserts. By the end of the month, Western Kingbirds and Bullock's Orioles were well established in many of their usual haunts, and observers anxiously awaited the wave of migrating songbirds just around the corner. March was a rather slow month with regard to rarities or out of season species. The few really notable species included the continuing Eastern Phoebe* from Cosumnes River Preserve (CRP), last reported on 3/15, and the continuing Common Black-Hawk** in north Stockton, last reported on 3/6. Surprisingly, a Common Black-Hawk was reported from the Marin Headlands on 3/31. Since the Stockton bird was a

Two Hammond's Flycatchers were reported from the Lake Solano campground on 3/6. It is likely that one of these is the same bird that had been reported there on 2/2. **California**Thrashers continued at an interesting location on the valley floor near Rds 2 and 86 in Yolo County. Another, quite rare in

first for Northern California, and only the fourth confirmed for the state, it is tempting to think it was the same bird. That this

southwestern desert species was report-

edly heading north from the Golden Gate

is another story.

Sacramento County, was found singing just downstream of the Sunrise Bridge on the American River Parkway from 3/24 through at least 4/1.

An early, or possibly wintering, **Pacific-slope Flycatcher** was found at CRP on 3/6. Others that may have wintered locally were a **Cassin's Vireo**, a **Black-throated Gray Warbler**, and a **Western Tanager**, all found at CRP on 3/8. A locally high total of seven **Common Ravens** was unprecedented for the lower portion

of CRP on 3/6. Two were seen nearby on 3/24. This species has expanded in Yolo County, but has yet to be regular in Sacramento County aside from a few low foothills locations and, perhaps, the Delta region.

A Pacific Golden-Plover* was first reported at the Woodland WWTP on 3/21. Up to three were reported sporadically through 4/1. A **Marbled Godwit** was a nice find north of I-5 and just west of Sacramento International Airport on 3/17. Other highlights include two Brown Creepers at Bobelaine on 3/4, 10+ Chipping Sparrows along Putah Creek near Winters on 3/5, and up to three Short-eared Owls continuing along Yolo Rd 155 throughout the month. Also of interest were **Steller's Jays** carrying nesting material along Hwy 128 between Winters and Monticello Dam near mile post 1.54.

Documentation of species listed with an asterisk (*) seen in the Sacramento area should be submitted to the Sacramento Bird Records Committee. Species with a double asterisk (**) are on the California Review List.

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
