Field Trip Findings

Goethe Park (9/12)-Leader Cathie LaZier reported: End of summer birding at Goethe was fairly quiet, but we had quick looks at Western Tanagers and Yellow Warblers, and great looks at a very cooperative male Wilson's Warbler. Two Downy Woodpeckers, possibly mom and a big kid, put on a frenetic display in the oaks. Vinegar Weed was in full bloom and with a hand lens we checked out what "Outdoor World of the Sacramento Region" described as "fantastic" blossoms.

Cosumnes River Preserve (9/11)– Leader John Schick reported: We had many good looks at migrants, including Warbling Vireo, Cassin's Vireo, Western Wood-Pewee, and Wilson's, Yellow, Black-throated Gray and Orange-crowned Warblers. We had our first cranes of the fall/summer season-five in the air and more will likely be around soon.

Evening Beaver Walk (9/10)-Besides four beavers and a muskrat, leader Jack Hiehle's parkway walk produced Yellow Warbler, Wood Duck, Great Horned Owl, California Quail, Downy Woodpecker, Bewick's Wren, White-tailed Kite, and Belted Kingfisher.

Yolo Basin Wildlife Area (9/5)-Despite hot weather, 29 birders joined this evening trip and were rewarded with looks at many Yellow-headed Blackbirds, White-faced Ibises coming in to roost, and a female Ruddy Duck with 5 chicks. Also, Least Sandpipers, Long-billed Dowitchers and Caspian Terns. Leader Maureen Geiger said that on the way out, the group saw three owls, one a Barn Owl for sure and others probably also Barn.

Point Reyes (9/4)-Thirty people, including a couple visiting from New Jersey, joined leader Chris Conard and found a nice mix of migrant songbirds at Five Brooks and excellent waterbirds at Abbott's Lagoon. Water birds



included two Black Skimmers, Caspian and Elegant Terns, and good numbers of shorebirds. "A Hudsonian Godwit, very rare in California, and a Baird's Sandpiper were seen by members of the group who hiked to the far end of the lagoon," Chris said. "An adult Snowy Plover on the beach with three to four chicks was seen by others. And a weasel, probably Longtail, was seen near the Lagoon parking lot".

Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District **Bufferlands** (8/29)-The best bird was a very cooperative Lincoln's Sparrow, leader Chris Conard's first-ever Bufferlands August record for the species. They usually arrive between Sept. 10 and 15. Otherwise, there were many migrating songbirds: Willow Flycatcher, "Western" Flycatcher, Western Kingbird, Orangecrowned Warbler, Townsend's Warbler, MacGillivray's Warbler, Wilson's Warbler,

Western Tanager, Black-headed Grosbeak and Lazuli Bunting. A Black-crowned Night-Heron was a first for over a month and several flocks of Ibises far to the west were flying south.

Bodega Bay (8/28)

On an unusually warm day on the coast, leader Andi Salmi's group enjoyed great views of a flock of Red Knots, a Hermit Warbler, Surfbirds and a Virginia Rail.

Lake Tahoe (8/21)-"Joe Ceriani said his favorite bird was a Nashville Warbler, while mine was a twirling Red-necked Phalarope at Tahoe Keys," leader Nancy Bittner reported. At the Taylor Creek Stream Profile, a Red-breasted Sapsucker perched for 9-10 minutes. Black-billed Magpies were present in numbers as the group listed 37 species on a beautiful sunny day.

Tall Forest, Cosumnes Preserve (8/21) The August Tall Forest bird survey was fairly unremarkable, but worth noting were the fly-over of an adult Peregrine Falcon (different from the Peregrine seen earlier in the week) and two Nashville Warblers. Leader John Trochet said these warblers are much more common at Cosumnes in the spring and are more regular at other sites in the lower Sacramento Valley in the fall.

Evening Beaver Walk (8/17)-According to the Sacramento Area Checklist, you're lucky to see a Lesser Nighthawk on 1 to 9 percent of trips. But leader Jack Hiehle's group saw the bird on the parkway near Rio Americano High School. They also saw Caspian Tern, Great Horned Owl, Pied-billed Grebe and Belted Kingfisher, along with 4 Beavers.

Yuba Pass and Sierra Valley

 (8/14)-Highlights included juvenile Virginia Rail and Sora, Sandhill Cranes, Band-tailed Pigeons, Williamson's and Redbreasted Sapsuckers, Sage Thrashers, several species of warblers and sparrows, and a nice flock of Yellow-headed Blockbirde, "An interacting

ed Blackbirds. "An interesting array of eclipse and half-grown

ducks strained our identification skills," leader Chris Conard said.

Correction: After her 8/1 Yolo Basin Wildlife Area trip, leader Maureen Geiger reported that her group had seen quite a few Semipalmated Plovers. In the September Observer I managed miraculously to transform them into Semipalmated Sandpipers. Sorry, Maureen.

Sunday, October 3, 8am Goethe Park Morning Walk Leader: Cathie LaZier 457-6882 empid@sbcglobal.net

On this morning walk we'll be looking for early winter returnees, such as sparrows, Ruby-crowned Kinglets, Hermit Thrushes and Yellow-Rumped Warblers. Trip will end before noon. This is a good trip for beginners. Meet Cathie at the first parking lot on the right past the kiosk. There is a \$4 per car entrance fee. If you wish, you can meet Cathie at the corner of Rod Beaudry Drive and Folsom Blvd. at 7:50am to carpool into the park.

Saturday, October 9, 8:30am-1:30pm Bufferlands Habitat Restoration Workshop

Are you interested in Habitat Restoration? If you are a student, volunteer, consultant, professional restorationist, or would just like to learn more about this critical aspect of conservation, we invite you to participate in the Bufferlands Habitat Restoration Workshop. In 1990, the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District (SRCSD) began numerous ongoing habitat

restoration projects on its 2,650-acre Bufferlands. Over the years, the natural resource staff has applied and developed many techniques that have led to successful projects. This workshop will draw from over ten

years of onsite restoration experience. You will see the restoration sites up-close as we discuss how the projects were implemented, what worked, and how we addressed challenges. We will walk through a portion of the Upper Beach Lake project and discuss several sites and management strategies. 
Sunday, October 10, 6:30am Coastal Trip Leader: Tim Fitzer 961-5871 spskua@aol.com

Bill will then suggest where we can go to see more birds and fall color.


A CALL FOR BURROWING OWL AND SWAINSON'S HAWK NEST LOCATIONS

and an immature **Golden Eagle** was reported from Stone Lakes on 8/22. A family group of **Dark-eyed Juncos** with four juveniles at CRP provide more evidence that this species is gaining a tenuous foothold as a local breeder. On 8/24 at CRP, a **Dusky Flycatcher** was reported along with good numbers of other migrants including a **Yellow-breasted Chat**. Local mammal reports include a **bobcat** at "the Point" along the River Walk at CRP and the first record of a **red fox**, an introduced species, at CRP on 8/8.

LODI CRANE FESTIVAL-WETLANDS TOUR

SRWTP Constructed Wetlands Tour November, 6 & 7, 7:30 am - 11:30 am

The Sacramento Constructed Wetlands Demonstration Project is a five-year project of the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District that was conducted from January 1994 to December 1998. The project was designed to describe how treatment wetlands remove trace metals. Besides proving very efficient at increasing water quality, the small wetland also created habitat for a variety of birds and mammals. A total of 98 bird species, including nine California Species of Concern and 18 confirmed nesting species, were observed at the constructed wetlands and the immediately surrounding environs. When compared to a nearby natural wetland, the emergent marsh habitat at the treatment wetland contained higher densities for six of fifteen wetland dependent bird species.

Tour participants can expect to see sora and Virginia rails, common moorhens, waterfowl, and other wetland birds. If lucky, they may even see a least bittern.

Seasonal Observatíons

August 1 to August 31 Rare and Unusual Bird Reports 783-2331

While August could not compare with the great reports from June and July, there were several excellent reports along with good numbers of expected migrant songbirds and shorebirds. Unfortunately, concern over West Nile Virus has resulted in pressure on wetlands managers to wait until cooler weather before flooding seasonal wetlands. While not a loss in wetlands acreage, there is a temporal loss of wetlands available to waterbirds and shorebirds. Consequently, the few Sandhill Cranes seen over Cosumnes River Preserve (CRP) at the end of the month did not have much inducement to land.

The best report, and ultimately the most frustrating, was of a **Swainson's Warbler** near the Accidental Forest at CRP on 8/1. This species has never been acceptably documented in the state, and the brief views this bird allowed at the initial sighting were all that could be obtained despite much subsequent searching. Near the same location, two to three **Grasshopper Sparrows** were found from 8/1 to 8/5, with one on 8/24.

Other excellent songbird reports include a **Least Flycatcher** seen and heard along Putah Creek on private property in Yolo County on 8/31. A calling **Great Crested Flycatcher** was reported along Willow Slough near the visitor center at CRP on 8/14. The date is earlier than any accepted record for this species in the state. It is possible that it is the same bird that was reported on the unprecedented date of 7/5 just a mile

to the west. An adult male **Northern Parula** was reported on 8/21 in Solano County along Mace Rd at the south fork of Putah Creek.

The bulk of the shorebird reports came from the Davis Wetlands. Juvenile **Semipalmated Sandpipers** were regularly reported from 8/4 to 8/25, and one to two **Marbled Godwits** were present throughout the month. **Baird's Sandpipers** were also regular at the wetlands in ones and twos, with

a high of four on 8/19. A **Sanderling** was present from 8/20 to 8/23 at the Davis Wetlands, while another **Sanderling** was reported at the Woodland Wastewater

Treatment Plant on 8/5. A **Solitary Sandpiper** was reported at the Davis Wetlands on 8/16 and at the adjacent Davis Sewage Ponds on 8/25.

The limited shorebird habitat available at CRP produced reports of Marbled Godwits (one on 8/5, two on 8/8), a Semipalmated Sandpiper on 8/7, a Pectoral Sandpiper on 8/13, a Baird's Sandpiper on 8/14, and a Snowy Plover on 8/22. One to two Baird's Sandpipers were present at the Sacramento Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant on 8/19, and a Snowy Plover was on the surrounding Bufferlands on 8/11. Good shorebird numbers, including one Baird's Sandpiper, were reported along Riosa Rd to the west of Sheridan in Placer County on 8/31. An apparent first Amador County record of Baird's Sandpiper was reported at the lone Sewage Ponds on 8/19. On 8/22, the sewage ponds south of Dixon along Pedrick Rd produced reports of a Sabine's Gull, a Solitary Sandpiper, and a Snowy Plover.

Other interesting reports include the **Brown Pelican** found at Stone Lakes National Wildlife Refuge on 7/19 and continuing through press time, an adult **Western Gull** at the Davis Wetlands beginning on 8/21, and single adult **Peregrine Falcons** at the Davis Wetlands and CRP. A **Prairie Falcon** reported from the Sacramento County Bufferlands on 8/12 was an unexpected summer record. An immature **Bald Eagle** was reported through the spring and summer at Lake Berryessa *Observations* continued on page 5
