Birding Ecotourism in Paraguay John Sterling

John will talk about his adventures on a 17 day trip through Paraguay. From the dry Chaco in the west to the atlantic rainforests of the east, this country will soon be on the map for international birders. John was the team leader that developed a curriculum for training birding guides in Paraguay for National Audubon Society and the Inter American Development Bank. He was able to bird with several of the graduates of the Advanced Training Course. John will talk about the new opportunities for birding ecotourism and will illustrate his talk with some of this thousands of photos taken on his trip.

John Sterling is a wildlife biologist and consultant whose clients include The Nature Conservancy, National Audubon Society, the Center for Natural Lands Management, CA Department of Water Resources, The Kern Water Bank and the Smithsonian Institution. He was a former

staff avian ecologist at the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center, and for several universities and US Forest Service research labs in additional to working for two environmental consulting firms in California. John is a diehard birder since 1971 and loves teaching his identification workshops and leading his international tours (spots open in 2017: Uganda, Colombia, and Paraguay).

## Field Trip Findings

Bufferlands (9/11) - Leader Chris Conard reported: "We had a good outing with 15 participants on a cool and somewhat breezy morning with good bird activity. Our focus was on finding migrant songbirds, and they didn't disappoint. We found two Warbling Vireos, five Orange-crowned Warblers, five Common Yellowthroats, eight Yellow Warblers, nine Black-throated Gray Warblers, eight Western Tanagers, three Lazuli Buntings, and a Blue Grosbeak. Other birds included heard-only MacGillivray's Warblers, poorly/quickly seen Pacific-slope and Willow flycatchers, a few lingering Swainson's Hawks, plus a few butterflies including Monarchs, Lorquin's Admirals, a Common Checkered Skipper, and a West Coast Lady."

Mather Regional Park (9/10) - Leader Wayne Blunk reported: "Fifteen spirits enjoyed a cool early Autumn morning to spiritedly identify 51+ species. Even before getting out of the parking lot, the group was treated to a low altitude flyby over the lake of 15 American White Pelicans. Sharp eyes and seasoned experience identified a Willow Flycatcher, Orange-crowned and Yellow warblers. Mute Swans were abundant with 15 seen in what appeared to be three different families. A large number of Greattailed Grackles swarmed the picnic area. Raptors were surprisingly scarce except for one Cooper's Hawk and three Whitetailed Kites. It appears that White-breasted Nuthatches may have nested and fledged young as three were seen close together and one was spotted going in and out of a tree cavity. All in all, another splendid morning of birding."

**North Bay Hotspots** (9/3) — Leader Scott Hoppe reported: "Eleven people joined me for a good day in the field, despite a very windy afternoon. I decided that we would visit the same locations as my previous field trip since it had been very productive before. We started at American Canyon Wetlands where the highlights included 14 species of shorebirds, including several Lesser Yellowlegs, good views of Virginia Rail and great views of a Sora out in the open, very close by. The group also enjoyed watching the aerobatics of a Peregrine Falcon as it made several dives at scattering shorebirds, hoping to snag a meal. At our second stop, Huichica Creek, we were greeted by very strong winds, which hindered the birding quite

a bit. But we were able to see hundreds of Western and Least sandpipers, and discuss the differences between the two. A highlight here was a leucistic Western Sandpiper that was almost entirely white with just a few dusky feathers. A quick stop at the neighboring farm pond netted us a single Red-necked Phalarope. We tallied 50 species for the day."

Yolo Basin Wildlife Area (8/30) — Maureen Geiger, co-leader with Cathie LaZier, reported: "We had a nice, easy trip to YBWA this evening. Although it was in the low 90s when we started out, seven of us drove the tour route and saw more than 35 species of birds. Close up Caspian Terns and a cooperative Blackshouldered Kite in beautiful evening light were the highlights. (Due to a little "leader confusion," 5 birders went with the leaders and 15 went on their own!!!)

River Bend Park (8/28) — Leader Cathie LaZier reported: "Seven birders joined me for this generally slow birding morning. We had an abundance of Whitebreasted Nuthatches, and an influx of Bewick's Wrens. We spent some time listening to the differences in the individual wren's songs and calls. We watched an Osprey's unsuccessful fishing attempts, and were surprised by an unexpected (on the river) Black-necked Stilt. Vinegar Weed and Nude Buckwheat were still in bloom. E-bird reported a trip count of 33 species."

Alpine County, CA and Douglas County, **NV** (8/27) — Leader Jane Taylor reported: "A group of 10, we headed up Highway 50, and after spotting several Bandtailed Pigeons on power lines in Pollock Pines, we arrived at Mud Lake east of Highway 88 in Nevada. Our hospitable Woodford's Christmas Count hosts, George and Bobby Goodspeed, gave us access to the shore and a good many waterfowl and shorebirds. Highlights included Common Merganser, Gadwall, Redhead and Ruddy Duck; Pied-billed, Eared and Western grebes; Red-necked Phalarope; Double-crested Cormorant; American Avocet; White-faced Ibis, a pair of Sandhill Cranes; and California and some Ring-billed gulls. From the shore were spotted perched Bald Eagle and soaring sub-adult Golden Eagle noted by its white wing patches. Other raptors included Ferruginous Hawk and Prairie Falcon. A visit to the barns yielded Great

Horned and Barn owls. At our lunch spot, Indian Creek Reservoir, we added Osprey, Spotted Sandpiper and Clark's Nutcracker. Also near water en route to Markleeville were Western Wood-Pewee, Chipping Sparrow and Green-tailed Towhee. Though we missed Pinyon Jay and American Dipper and many wood-peckers and passerines, we had a good day tallying about 55 species."

Wright's Lake (8/24) — Tim Fitzer, coleader with Ann Burris, reported: "It was a perfect day to go birding in the Sierra, not too hot with a cooling breeze. Eleven people ventured to Wright's Lake for a fun day. Some of the highlights were: Evening Grosbeak, a Goshawk that flew in front of us into the trees, Williamson's Sapsucker, Cassin's Finches, Spotted Sandpiper, a hen with 6 young, Common Mergansers and Ospreys. We had a fun time and lifers for some."

Truckee/Tahoe Mountain Birding (8/21) — Leader Jane Taylor reported: "Four of us made this trip to visit a new destination, Webber Lake north of Truckee. We diverted on Scott Hoppe's learning of a rare CA visitor, a Solitary Sandpiper reported a couple of days before near Donner Summit. Scott found the bird in its reported location, and we observed and photographed it at close range. Arriving at Webber Lake too late to do much hiking, we went only as far as Lacey Creek where we saw a Willow Flycatcher. In the trees were many fresh nest-holes and numbers of Chipping Sparrows, Mountain Chickadees and Dark-eyed Juncos. On our way out, we saw a molting Townsend's Solitaire; our final afternoon stop at Martis Creek Reservoir vielded Vesper Sparrows, Gadwalls, Piedbilled Grebes and some impressive beaver dams on Martis Creek. Altogether we totaled 38 species."

Granite Springs Road (8/16) — Tim Fitzer, co-leader with Ann Burris, reported: "A beautiful day in the Sierra to Granite Springs Rd near Wright's Lake. Ten people enjoyed the mountain road birding. Some of the highlights were: Yellow, MacGillivray's, Orange-crowned, and many Yellow-rumped warblers; Lewis's and Hairy woodpeckers, Brown Creepers and a Steller's Jay imitating a Red-tailed Hawk that fooled everyone."

#### **Field Trip Information**

For questions regarding the trip or to check the status of the trip in case of unfavorable weather conditions, please call the trip leader first. If he or she cannot be reached, for trips through October 29 contact the scheduler Cathie LaZier, empid@earthlink.net, 457-6882. For trips from October 30 contact the scheduler Maureen Geiger, 444-0804, mkgeiger@comcast.net.

Due to insurance requirements, Sacramento Audubon leaders are not allowed to organize ridesharing/carpools. Participants are, however, encouraged to voluntarily share rides. Any carpool arrangements are private agreements between the driver and the passengers. Drivers must carry adequate insurance cover-

age. Please be courteous and share gas expenses with the driver. FRS radios can be helpful on all trips. Starting times are the actual time the trip leaves the meeting place. Try to arrive early, especially if you want driving directions or plan to carpool. Groups must make prior arrangements with the trip leader. In case of INCLEMENT WEATHER contact the trip leader for trip status.

#### Saturday, October 1, 7am Putah Creek Preserve Leader: Ben Graber, 844-8682 Bgraber984@gmail.com

Join Ben for a morning walk along Putah Creek in search of late migrants and wintering riparian birds. If the participants so desire, we may also visit Solano Lake or Monticello Dam. Meet Ben at the Park and Ride lot off I-80 in West Sacramento. From Sacramento, take the West Capitol Avenue exit, turn left at the light, and then left again into the Park and Ride lot. This is a good trip for experienced birders and beginners alike.

#### Sunday, October 2, 8am Bobelaine Sanctuary Leader: Maureen Geiger, 281-6652 mkgeiger@comcast.net

Bobelaine is a 430-acre National Audubon Sanctuary on the Feather River, managed by Sacramento Audubon. This riparian forest of cottonwoods, sycamores and willows is home to a wide variety of birds and wildlife. Join Maureen for a 1-2 mile walk along the trials looking for resident, fall migrating and returning wintering birds. Herons, egrets, cormorants and grebes may be on the water, and a variety of sparrows and other passerines settling in for the fall and winter. Meet Maureen at the Bel Air shopping center on Arena Blvd. From Sacramento, take I-5 north to Arena Blvd, go west (left) over the freeway. Take the first left, Duckhorn Rd, and then turn right into the parking area. We will meet on the north side of the parking lot between Wells Fargo and Golden 1. If you wish to meet at Bobelaine, take Hwy 99 north toward Yuba City and about 2 miles north of the Feather River Bridge turn right on Laurel Avenue. Follow Laurel to the dead end at the Bobelaine parking

lot. The group will probably arrive there about 8:30.

#### Wednesday, October 5, 7am Glenn Hall Park, Paradise Beach American River Parkway Leader: Sally Walters Schmoldt, 710-1077, bajaowl@gmail.com

Sally birds this area regularly, and joining her in the different months will give you a good idea of the seasonal changes along the parkway. Walking along the levee and willow covered sand bars, Sally will be looking for returning migrating birds and young of the year. From Highway 50 take Howe Ave north to Fair Oaks Blvd. Turn left onto Fair Oaks and cross over the American River. Turn right on Carlson Ave, which is the first stop light past the American River bridge. Continue on Carlson Ave to its end, at Glenn Hall Park. Meet on top of the levee. This will be a fairly easy walk, ending about 10am, but expect some uneven terrain, gravel, sand, and rock cobble. This is an excellent trip for beginners.

#### Saturday, October 8, 7:30am Mather Lake Leader: Wayne Blunk, 876-0457 Wayne.Blunk@gmail.com

Mather Lake is one of Wayne's favorite birding locations at all seasons of the year, and he always turns up quite a list of bird species. Possibilities include Yellowheaded Blackbird, Common Yellowthroat, American Bittern, Green Heron, and Piedbilled Grebe. Meet in the parking lot of Mather Regional Park; from Highway 50, go south on Zinfandel about 2-1/2 miles. After crossing Douglas Blvd, take the first left into the park area. There is a \$5 per car entrance fee; your Sac County Parkway pass is valid here. This is a wonderful trip for beginning birders.

# Sunday, October 9, 9am Family Friendly Trip William Pond Park Leader: Craig DeMartini, 599-3300 cloudwalk7@icloud.com

Meet Craig along the first parking area just past the entrance kiosk, for this morning walk looking for returning migrants and resident birds. Along the river mergansers and possibly goldeneye can be found in the backwaters and wrens and towhees call from the bushes. California Quail, Western Bluebirds and Lark Sparrows may be found in the park area, and Craig will be looking for returning White and Golden-crowned Sparrows. Although the focus of the trip is birds, Craig can also help you identify some of the plants. Trip will end before noon. A Sac County Park Pass or \$5 entry fee is required for all vehicles. From the intersection of Fair Oaks and Arden, follow Arden east and it runs into the park. This is an excellent trip for beginners of all ages.

#### Wednesday, October 12, 7am SHARP Calaveras Big Trees State Park Leader: Bill Bianco, 889-4849 biancowm@yahoo.com

We'll take a leisurely walk on the one mile loop trail through the North Grove of Giant Sequoias, enjoying dogwood, hazelnut, and big leaf maple in fall color. Hoped-for birds include White-headed Woodpecker, Brown Creeper, Goldencrowned Kinglet, Winter Wren, and Redbreasted Nuthatch. Stellar's Jay and Douglas Squirrel are a certainty. Afterwards we'll picnic at the meadow, so bring a lunch and liquids, and we'll make a short stop at the Visitor Center before an optional short afternoon hike. Meet Bill at the Starbucks in the Raley's Shopping Center in the 8300

block of Folsom Blvd (between Watt and Howe), to LEAVE at 7am SHARP. Or meet in the large visitor's day parking lot at Calaveras around 9am. There is an entrance fee to this State Park. This trip is good for beginners.

# Saturday, October 15, 7am Bothe-Napa Valley State Park and American Canyon Leader: Dan Williams, (714) 943-1266 jaegermaestro@yahoo.com

Join Dan for a full day of wine country birding. We'll start at Bothe-Napa Valley State Park (\$8 day use fee per car), where Northern Pygmy-Owl, Pileated Woodpecker and Pacific Wren as well as late migrant thrushes, vireos and warblers will be among our top targets. After our picnic lunch, we'll travel down Highway 29 to American Canyon and Wetlands Edge Park where we'll scope the tidal flats for shorebirds. Finally, on our way home we'll stop at Lynch Canyon Open Space where we'll hope to spot Golden Eagle, Prairie Falcon, and Ferruginous and/or Rough-legged Hawks. Bring a lunch and liquids and be prepared for a moderate morning hike in the hills, and an easy afternoon walk on the flats. Meet at the Park and Ride off I-80 in West Sacramento, From Sacramento, take the West Capitol Ave Exit #81; turn left at the light and then left again into the Park and Ride lot.

## Saturday, October 15, 10:30am Effie Yeaw Family Nature Walk

This family friendly nature walk will be at the Effie Yeaw Nature Center in Carmichael. Acorn Woodpeckers and Wild Turkeys are abundant, but sharp eyes and ears may find Spotted Towhees or Bushtits as well. Reservations are not needed; families can simply show up and enjoy a one-hour walk in the lovely nature area with naturalists from the Nature Center and birders Maureen Geiger and Sue Darst from Audubon. For directions, see sacnaturecenter.net. A Sac County Park Pass or \$5 entry fee is required for all vehicles.

#### Sunday, October 16, 8am Humbug Creek, Folsom Leader: Mara Weston, 208-3222 Mara\_weston@yahoo.com

Meet Mara at the Cummings Family Park on the corner of Creekside Drive and Oak Avenue Parkway in Folsom. You'll follow Humbug Creek around an easy 2-3 mile paved loop. This is a good place to look for a variety of woodpeckers, ducks, Common Gallinule and returning wintering sparrows and kinglets. Sometimes River Otters are seen in the creek. This is a great trip for beginning birders. Trip will end by 11am.

#### Tuesday, October 18, 8am Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area Leaders: Tim Fitzer 870-5207 spskua2@comcast.net Ann Burris 947-7573 burris.nellieann@gmail.com

This great area is only10 minutes from downtown Sacramento. Depending on the extent of flooded fields on the auto tour route, there may be good numbers of shorebirds and waterfowl. Tim and Ann may do some short walks on the foot trails to get better vantage points. From Sacramento, take I-80 west, take the first exit (#78) at the west end of the Yolo Causeway. Turn right at the stop sign and go under the freeway, then make a left up onto the levee and drop down into the Wildlife Area. The trip begins at the first parking lot (Lot A). Scopes are helpful on this trip, as are FRS radios. This is an excellent trip for both beginners and more experienced birders. Trip will end before noon.

#### Saturday, October 22, 7am SHARP! Hope Valley – Alpine County Fall Foliage Birding Leader: Dan Brown, 704-0951 naturestoc@aol.com

Autumn color explodes in mid-October at Hope Valley. Join Dan to enjoy the fall foliage and to look for resident and specialty birds that include: Sooty (Blue) Grouse, Williamson's Sapsucker, Steller's Jay, Clark's Nutcracker, Mountain Chickadee, Townsend's Solitaire, and Cassin's Finch. Some of the terrain is hilly, so wear sturdy shoes and dress in layers. A camera is a recommended addition to your pack. Bring water and lunch. FRS radios would also be helpful on this trip. Meet Dan at the north end of the Raley's parking lot in El Dorado Hills. From Hwy 50 east take Exit #30B; turn right on El Dorado Hills Blvd and go north under the freeway to the shopping center on your right. Meet at the far north end of the parking lot. We will leave at 7am SHARP!

Saturday, October 22, 5pm till sunset Sandhill Cranes and Other Wintering Birds Cosumnes River Preserve/Delta area Trip by Save Our Sandhill Cranes, Inc. Coordinator: Mike Savino, 446-1392 Our Sandhill Cranes are back! And your SOSC leaders will also be looking for the wide variety of waterfowl, shorebirds and raptors who feed in the flooded fields and marshy areas of the delta. After birding the boardwalk at the CRP Lost Slough Wetlands, we'll drive along Desmond Road, and possibly on to Woodbridge Road or Staten Island to see flocks of cranes coming in to roost. Dress for changeable weather; bring binoculars, snacks and water if you wish. Meet at the north end of the upper parking lot, near the native plant garden; directions available at www.cosumnes.org.

#### Tuesday, October 25, 8am Colusa National Wildlife Refuge Leader: Dan Tankersley, 662-1290 dtankers@winfirst.com

Fall migration is underway, and Colusa NWR is a great location to view various species of newly arrived ducks and geese. We will spend a good amount of time on the viewing platform, and possibly take an easy walk on a level trail through riparian habitat next to the main viewing pond. We will take the short auto tour to finish our outing to this wonderful NWR. Scopes and FRS radios will be helpful on this trip. Meet in the Bel Air shopping center on Arena Blvd. From Sacramento take I-5 north to Arena Blvd, go west over the freeway. Take

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the first left, Duckhorn Road, and then turn right into the parking lot. Meet on the north side of the parking lot between Wells Fargo and Golden 1. Rain, strong wind, or thick fog cancels. Bring snacks and liquids as the trip will end in the very late morning to very early afternoon.

Join Cathie for an easy walk of about a mile and a half, viewing the wintering waterfowl, egrets, herons and shorebirds in the flooded wetland ponds. We'll stop by the Ducks In Scopes event, which will have a variety of spotting scopes trained on the various birds, as well as microscopes to see the aquatic invertebrates in "Duck Soup", dipped directly from the ponds. This is an excellent walk for beginning birders. Meet at the CRP Visitor Center parking lot. Bring water and snacks and dress for changeable weather. From Sacramento, take I-5 south to Twin Cities Road; go left (east) to the stop sign at Franklin Blvd; turn right (south) on Franklin and, driving through the Preserve, watch for the Visitor Center parking lot on your left. Join SOSC leaders looking for the wide variety of waterfowl, shorebirds, cranes and raptors who feed in the flooded fields and marshy areas of the delta. After birding the boardwalk at the CRP Lost Slough Wetlands, we'll drive along Desmond Road, and possibly to Woodbridge Road or Staten Island to see flocks of cranes coming in to roost. Dress for changeable weather; bring binoculars, snacks and water if you wish. Meet at the north end of the upper parking lot, near the native plant garden; directions available at www.cosumnes.org.

#### **DUCKS (AND MORE) IN SCOPES**

A great trip for families, youth groups and newer birders. This is an opportunity to work on duck identification as well as other wetland birds.

Stop by the Cosumnes River Preserve and check out Ducks In Scopes, where docents have a row of scopes set up, including lower ones for children, giving you good views of the many colorful ducks and other wetland birds. A microscope and hand lens provide close-up looks at 'Duck Soup', dishes of water dipped from the pond full of sand fleas, dragonfly nymphs, and other squiggly things that provide the protein the birds are feeding on. The Preserve is a quick drive from Sacramento-south on I-5 to Twin Cities Road; left (east) on Twin Cities for 1 mile; then right (south) on Franklin Blvd. The viewing area is in the first parking lot on your right as you drive into the preserve. Come any time between 10am and 2pm, on the following dates:

# ANNUAL ARNHA COUNT SATURDAY, DECEMBER 3

Two of Audubon's greatest accomplishments are the 116 years of the North American Christmas Bird Count data and the new high tech bird list system we all know as ebird. Both of these citizen science monitoring efforts have taught us more about bird population status, movements and migration than any single research effort. And when you think about it, this is not a surprise since there are thousands and thousands of us participating.

Sacramento has its own local citizen science effort counting birds, mammals, reptiles and amphibians along the American River Parkway - the annual ARNHA Wildlife (or Critter) Count. This is our 32nd year of this first Saturday in December effort and the coordination of the count is coming back to the American River Natural History Association (ARNHA) and Effie Yeaw Nature Center (with our thanks to the past coordinators: Lea Laundry and Dr. Wm. Avery). The two new coordinators are Paul Tebbel, the director of the Effie Yeaw Nature Center, and Rachael Cowan, one of the senior naturalists. Past participants should have received a preliminary email in early September. Anyone interested in being added to the communication list should send an email to Rachael (rachaelc@sacnaturecenter.net). This year's count is on Saturday, December 3. Your participation is encouraged-there is no fee.

ed: "It was a great day of birding for just five of us. We had thousands of shorebirds over all, with the highlight and bird of the day being Baird's Sandpiper, with one found at American Canyon Wetlands and then two more seen at the Huichica Creek Unit of the Napa/Sonoma Wetlands area. Another good find was an unexpected Red-breasted Merganser, first spotted by Karen Cadle at American Canyon. We also had Virginia Rail and Sora out in the open at American Canyon. Everyone had a good time, with some humorous and adventurous moments thrown in."

Point Reyes (8/13) — Leader Chris Conard reported: "Eight of us enjoyed a great day at the coast and a pleasant break from the Valley heat. Our first stop was at Bolinas Lagoon where there were recent reports of a Bartailed Godwit. Some of us may have glimpsed the bird, but it was at least a half-mile away, so viewing conditions were nearly impossible. Nevertheless, we saw over 2,000 Elegant Terns, a good mix of shorebirds, including Black-bellied and Semipalmated plovers, Marbled Godwits, Long-billed Curlews, Whimbrels, Willets, and Western and Least sandpipers. At Five Brooks we had many looks at Wilson's Warblers, a Hutton's Vireo, an immature male Wood Duck, flyover Band-tailed Pigeons, and we heard but did not see a Pileated Woodpecker. Drake's Bay and the Fish Docks were a little slow, but highlights included three species of loons, including good scope views of two Red-throated Loons in breeding plumage, diving Elegant Terns, noisy Pigeon Guillemots, plus harbor seals, elephant seals, elk, and a covote."

Dragonflies, Bear Creek, Colusa County (7/16) — Leader Tim Manolis reported: "Only a couple of folks showed up for the trip, both of them from out-of-town (so no SAS members came out). We had a nice total of 21 species of dragonflies and damselflies. The prime target species, Giant Darner, largest North American dragonfly at the northern edge of its range, made a nice showing. We also had nice looks at Gray Sanddragons, White-belted Ringtails, Pale-faced Clubskimmers and Western River Cruisers, among other things."

While many are waiting for September, for sheer numbers and diversity of migrants, August is hard to top-especially before the heat of mid-day. Massive numbers of flycatchers, vireos, and warblers migrate through the Central Valley, with only a small fraction ever detected. At the same time, shorebird numbers are also at or near their peak. Signs of fall start to creep in with shorter days and the first locally reported Sandhill Cranes this season were flying over Sacramento on 8/31. Continuing from earlier in the summer, **Least Bitterns** were reported from Mather Lake on 8/20, Bridgeway Island Pond in West Sacramento on 8/28, and up to two were reported throughout the month from the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area (YBWA).

Many of the notable reports this month come from the shorebird group, which is expected for August. Single **Solitary**

Sandpipers were reported from the Davis Wetlands on 8/19 and the Ione WTP from 8/22-23. A Marbled Godwit was at the Sacramento Regional WTP (SRWTP) from 8/29-31 and a juvenile Sanderling was at the same location on 8/31-9/1. **Semipalmated Sandpipers** were reported at YBWA on 8/7 and 8/12-13, a single was reported at SRWTP on 8/31, and another was reported from the Arbuckle WTP in Colusa County on 8/1 along with a juvenile Baird's Sandpiper. Baird's Sandpipers were also reported at the Winters WTP on 8/25-31, with a high of three on 8/29, and from YBWA from 8/30-31. Three Pectoral Sandpipers were found at the YBWA on 8/31.

A **Calliope Hummingbird** was a nice find at Ancil Hoffman on 8/28. On 8/9, a **Gray Flycatcher** was found along Michigan Bar Rd. This species is detected far more often in spring migration. Somewhat more expected was a **Dusky Flycatcher** at the Orr portion of CRP on

8/27 and a **Hammond's Flycatcher** at the Tall Forest on 8/28. Two Pileated Woodpeckers were seen eating grapes near the Fishing Access #1 parking area along Putah Creek west of Winters on 8/2, and a Steller's Jay found the same day at Fishing Access #2 was a surprise so early in the season. Among the few Yellow-breasted Chat reports was one of two birds on 8/27 along Babel Slough Rd on what was described as a morning "bustling with migrants." Three streaky juvenile Chipping Sparrows were found at the same location. A Green-tailed Towhee in a Carmichael Backyard on 8/21 was a nice find, and even more unexpected was a female Summer Tanager along Putah Creek near Hopkins Rd on 8/5, west of UC
