#### Thursday, October 15, 2015 Effie Yeaw Nature Center Assembly Room, 7pm

Japan: Iconic Birds of The North, and the Search For Sandhill Cranes in the South Sean Wirth

Join local conservation activist and naturalist, Sean Wirth, on a photographic tour of Japan's fabulous birds. The first stop on the journey will be the frigid winter snows of northern Hokkaido where we will spend time with red crowned cranes, whooper swans, white tailed eagles, Stellar's sea eagles, Blakiston's fish owls, harlequin ducks and many others. And then, we will head to south-

western Kyushu where we will try to find the small handful of sandhill cranes who journey there from Siberia to spend the winter with Japan's hooded and white naped cranes, as well as spoonbills, herons, egrets, snipes, and various waterfowl. You will have to come to the presentation to find out if the sandhills were found.

A native to California, Sean received an under-

graduate degree in zoology from UC Berkeley and a master's degree in English literature from SF State. After a successful career as an infill developer, where he bought architecturally and historically interesting buildings and restored them to use as rentals, he retired ten years ago and has since devoted himself to conserving what remains of our natural heritage here in the Central Valley. He currently is the conservation chair for the Mother Lode Chapter

## Field Trip Findings

**SRWTP Bufferlands** (9/13) — Leader Chris Conard reported: "Twelve of us started out on a cool morning with a moderate breeze that ended rather warm and humid. There were a lot of migrant warblers on the move, but many were detected only by 'sip' flight calls or as vanishing silhouettes. Highlights included close views of a Semipalmated Plover, Spotted Sandpipers, and a group of six Vaux's Swifts that, rare for this species which often evades extended observations, fluttered overhead for several minutes. A late lingering Western Kingbird was a bit of a surprise for the date. Migrant songbirds included a Willow Flycatcher, several Orange-crowned Warblers, poorly seen or heard-only MacGillivray's Warblers, many calling and briefly seen Common Yellowthroats, Yellow Warblers, good views of Black-throated Gray Warblers, and several Wilson's Warblers. Some of us had good views of recently arrived Lincoln's Sparrows, three lingering female/juvenile Blue Grosbeaks, and abundant American Goldfinches in the showy fields of annual sunflower. Perhaps the highlight of the day was a group of up to six river otters that put in several appearances."

Sailor Bar, American River Parkway (9/12) — Leader Ben Graber reported: "Highlights included several Phainopeplas, Cedar Waxwings, a Wilson's Warbler, Sharp-shinned, Cooper's, Red-tailed, and Red-shouldered hawks, California Quail, and some close-up looks at a Great Blue Heron. It was a good day overall, not as hot as expected, and with a decent variety of birds."

Sacramento Bar, American River Parkway (9/6) — Leader Paul Cordero reported: "Twenty-seven intrepid birders set out intent on learning the local bird songs. Bird calls identified included: Bewick's Wren, Oak Titmouse, Killdeer, California Towhee, Acorn and Nuttall's Woodpecker, White-breasted Nuthatch and Black Phoebe. We had great views of sunning Turkey Vultures, Great Blue Herons and Great Egrets. Migrating warblers included Yellow and Wilson's, with good views of our local Orange-crowned Warbler. A pair of Ospreys and a late Swainson's Hawk topped off the day."

**North Bay Hotspots** (9/5) — Leader Scott Hoppe reported: "Eight people joined me for a great day of birding a couple of North Bay locations. We started out with a stop at a farm pond west of Petaluma

to look for a Ruff that had been reported. We found the bird almost immediately and everyone got great views. Then, it was on to Point Reves. Our first stop was at Drake's Beach where there were a lot of birds just off shore, including many Pacific and Red-throated Loons, Common Murres and Elegant Terns. Another highlight here was at least 5 Barn Owls that often flew between trees by the Visitors Center and trees by Drake's Monument. At Mendoza Ranch, we had several Great Horned Owls in the trees. We then went out to the Fish Docks, where we had 2 Wandering Tattlers. Our last stop was a farm pond where we counted 34 Rednecked Phalaropes. We tallied about 62 species over all. The Ruff and the Tattlers were life birds for a couple of people."

Alpine County (8/30) — Leader Jane Taylor reported: "Ten birders, including three from San Francisco/Golden Gate Audubon, made the trip to Alpine County on a clear, cool morning. We stopped at Grass Lake, circumnavigating and crossing a copse of trees, where we picked up Wilson's Warbler, Red- and White-breasted Nuthatch, Brown Creeper and Green-tailed Towhee. A target bird there, Sooty Grouse, was found as a pile of feathers where it met its demise. One participant also learned later that Grass Lake is the largest undisturbed sphagnum moss bog in the Sierra and is now part of a preserve. Visiting dilapidated buildings below Luther Pass, we saw Clark's Nutcrackers and Band-tailed Pigeons flying over. At a West Fork Carson River crossing below Sorenson's, we had two American Dippers in midmorning preening. We lunched at Indian Creek Reservoir and observed Eared and Piedbilled Grebes, Hairy and White-headed Woodpeckers, Yellow Warbler, Osprey, Bald Eagle, distant Mountain Quail and Pinyon Jays flying out and calling. On our return to Woodford's store, we saw up-close a mother Mountain Quail with young. Overall, we tallied upward of 60 species, and one of the San Francisco participants added 23 new birds to his list! That group hopes to attend more Sacramento Audubon outings."

River Bend Park (8/29) — Leader Cathie LaZier reported: "Seven people joined me for this morning walk. We spent a good bit of time sorting through flocks of small birds in the oaks, working on the confusing fall warblers. We did successfully

identify Yellow and Black-throated Gray, along with a few "yellow-colored warblers." Betty Kniffen spotted 2 obscure Green Herons, and Larry Hickey commented on the cryptic coloring of a group of California Quail as they blended into the background grasses. Vinegar Weed and Nude Buckwheat were in flower."

Cosumnes River Preserve (8/23) -Leader Jane Taylor reported: "Nine of us met in the parking lot at Cosumnes River Preserve on a sunny, breezy Sunday morning. A couple of us toted scopes and others had good cameras. We walked about 4.5 miles over the accessible trails to and from the river and tallied 30 species for the morning trip. Sightings of note included a good photo-op of a sunlit juvenile Green Heron; side-by-side comparisons of Nuttall's and Downy Woodpeckers singing; a Long-billed Curlew fly-over with calling; Black-throated Gray Warbler; a large flock of Bushtits and a small flock of Cedar Waxwings keening."

Bodega Bay (8/22) — Leader Andi Salmi reported: "A group of 15 birders enjoyed a beautiful, balmy, almost windless day at Bodega Bay. We birded Doran Beach wetlands, Bodega Head and Owl Canvon. A variety of shorebirds were enjoyed, including Semipalmated Plover, Least and Western sandpipers, Sanderling, Whimbrel, Marbled Godwit and others. Highlights included a beautiful Ruddy Turnstone with fresh plumage, Blackbellied Plovers with black bellies, and a Red Knot. Large flocks of Elegant Tern and small numbers of Caspian Tern were also viewed. Land birds included MacGillivray's and Yellow warblers, Warbling Vireo, Western Wood-pewee and Pacific-slope Flycatcher. Purple Martin provided a show of flight overhead."

Napa-Sonoma Marshes Wildlife Area (8/16) — Leader Scott Hoppe reported: "Thirteen participants enjoyed a great trip to the Napa-Sonoma Marshlands. The group included 3 people from the Napa area. Highlights included a Virginia Rail out in the open for several minutes; 14 species of shorebirds, including Lesser Yellowlegs; at least 2 Willow Flycatchers and 4 species of warblers. The flycatchers and warblers provided a great show from one spot at American Canyon Wetlands. We tallied 65 species over all."

Due to insurance requirements, Sacramento Audubon leaders are not allowed to organize ridesharing/carpools. Participants are, however, encouraged to voluntarily share rides. Any carpool arrangements are private agreements between the driver and the passengers. Drivers must carry adequate insurance coverage. Please be courteous and share gas expenses with the driver. FRS radios can be helpful on all trips. Starting times are the actual time the trip leaves the meeting place. Try to arrive early, especially if you want driving directions or plan to carpool. Groups must make prior arrangements with the trip leader. In case of INCLEMENT WEATHER contact the trip leader for trip status.

#### Thursday, October 1, 8am River Bend Park Leader: Cathie LaZier, 457-6882 empid@earthlink.net

Meet Cathie in the first parking lot on your right just past the entrance kiosk. We'll walk through the oak woodland and down to the river looking for the resident birds of the parkway, as well as possible migrants. This is a good trip for beginners. From Folsom Blvd, between Bradshaw and Mather Field Road, take Rod Beaudry Drive north into the park. A Sac County Park Pass or \$5 entry fee is required for all vehicles.

#### Saturday, October 3, 7:30am Solano Lake/Putah Creek Leader: Mark Sawyer, 968-1661 MarkSawyer3383@yahoo.com

The lake is a good area for wintering ducks including possible Barrow's Goldeneye and Hooded Mergansers. Phainopeplas are possible, and Pileated Woodpeckers have been found in the area several times during the last year. A drive up Putah Creek may turn up wintering passerines as well. There is a \$5 per car fee at the Lake Solano campground. Bring lunch and liquids and meet Mark at the Park and Ride in West Sacramento. From I-80 take the West Capitol Ave exit; turn left at the light; then left again into the lot. Plan on a trip lasting into the afternoon.

#### Sunday, October 4, 7am SHARP! Solano County Bay to Valley Leader: Dan Williams, 714-943-1266 jaegermaestro@yahoo.com

Join Dan for a full day of birding across Solano County, from the bay shores and back through the hills toward Vacaville. We'll start at Dan Foley Park across Lake Chabot from Six Flags Marine World in Vallejo. This city park is a hidden gem with mature redwood, bay, and manzanita harboring coastal residents such as Chestnutbacked Chickadee, Brown Creeper, Varied Thrush, and Townsend's Warbler, and many migrants as well as a nice variety of ducks and gulls on the lake. From there we will take Redwood Boulevard west to a little shopping center with an access point to view White Slough; the tidal flats we pass along Hwy 37 on our way to the coast which are pretty nearly always packed with shorebirds! Turning back east, we'll have lunch at Lynch Canyon Open Space, an excellent vantage point for raptors such as Golden Eagle, Prairie Falcon, and Ferruginous Hawk. We'll finish the day at Lagoon Valley between Fairfield and Vacaville, one of the best locations around for seeing copious amounts of diving ducks. In recent years some very nice rarities have shown up there including Trumpeter Swan, Tufted Duck, and Swamp Sparrow. Bring a lunch and liquids and meet Dan by 7am at the Park and Ride in West Sacramento. From I-80 take the West Capitol Ave exit; turn left at the light; then left again into the lot. Please note there is a \$5 parking fee per vehicle at Dan Foley Park.

#### Wednesday, October 7, 8am-noon Shadow Glen/Snowberry Creek Leader: Lea Landry, 638-1141 Ilandry46@comcast.net

This morning walk will include riparian habitat, ridge trails and a good view of Lake Natoma. Lea will be looking for both woodland birds and waterfowl. There may be some short steep climbs on the trail,

and if the rains come it may be muddy, so wear appropriate footwear. Bring liquids and snacks if you wish. Lea usually finds a nice variety of birds on this trip, which is suitable for both beginning and experienced birders. Meet Lea in the parking lot of the Snowberry Creek Equestrian Staging area (Shadow Glen Stables) about ¼ mile east on Main, from where Main and Sunset Avenues meet in Orangevale.

#### Saturday, October 10, 7am Putah Creek Preserve Leader: Ben Graber, 844-8682 Bgraber984@gmail.com

Join Ben for a morning walk along Putah Creek in search of late migrants and wintering riparian birds. If the participants so desire, we may also visit Lake Solano or Monticello Dam. Meet Ben at the Park and Ride lot off I-80 in West Sacramento. From Sacramento, take the West Capitol Avenue exit, turn left at the light, and then left again into the Park and Ride lot. This is a good trip for experienced birders and beginners alike.

#### Sunday, October 11, 8am William Pond Park Leader: Larry Hickey, 962-0387 Larryhickey1@gmail.com

Meet Larry along the first parking area just past the entrance kiosk, for this morning walk looking for returning migrants and resident birds. Along the river mergansers and possibly goldeneye can be found in the backwaters and wrens and towhees call from the bushes. California Quail, Western Bluebirds and Lark Sparrows may be found in the park area, and Larry will be looking for returning White and Golden-crowned

Sparrows. Trip will end before noon. A Sac County Park Pass or \$5 entry fee is required for all vehicles. From the intersection of Fair Oaks and Arden, follow Arden east and it runs into the park. This is an excellent trip for beginners.

#### Wednesday, October 14, 8am Nimbus Fish Hatchery/American River Leader: Craig DeMartini, 599-3300 Cloudwalk7@aol.com

Join Craig to check out the returning gulls and waterfowl as well as wintering passerines. Herons and egrets, Double-crested Cormorants, and White-throated Swifts can usually be seen, and Osprey, falcons and the occasional Bald Eagle are also possibilities. This is a good trip for both beginning and more experienced birders. Meet at the Nimbus Fish Hatchery parking lot. From Hwy 50 go north on Hazel Avenue; turn left on Gold Country Blvd and the Hatchery is on your right.

#### Saturday, October 17, 8am American River Parkway Leader: Darrell Mohr, 225-3999 mohrdd@gmail.com

Join Darrell for a leisurely walk on the north side of the river across from the Paradise Beach area. The area is fairly typical of most Parkway locations but does have an overabundance of grapes with slightly less blackberry and elderberry which helps in attracting possible overwintering fruit lovers such as Western Tanager. We may encounter common winter birds such as Fox and Lincoln Sparrow, Hermit Thrush, Common Goldeneye and crowned sparrows as well as residents such as Bewick's Wren, Spotted Towhee and California Quail. There are elevated views of the river and well-worn trails. Trip will probably end around 11am. Meet Darrell in the cul-de-sac at the south end of Ethan Way, just south of where Hurley Way goes into Gate 12 of Cal Expo. (Same meeting place as Bushy Lake trips, but the trip will go upstream.)

## Saturday, October 17, 10:30am Effie Yeaw Family Nature Walk

This family friendly nature walk will be at the Effie Yeaw Nature Center in Carmichael. Acorn Woodpeckers and Wild Turkeys are abundant, but sharp eyes and ears may find Spotted Towhees or Bushtits as well. Reservations are not needed; families can simply show up and enjoy a one-hour walk in the lovely Nature Area with

naturalists from the nature center and birders Maureen Geiger and Sharon Wisecarver from Audubon. For directions, see sacnaturecenter.net. A Sac County Park Pass or \$5 entry fee is required for all vehicles.

This recently opened Preserve has several miles of hiking trails in the beautiful rolling ranchland of Napa County. Join Maureen and Ken on a walk to see what Fall brings to the riparian area and the oak-studded hills. After a walk of about 1.5 miles on an easy trail, we will drive to the American Canyon Wetlands to have lunch, then bird our way along Wetlands Edge Road where we should find good numbers of ducks and shorebirds due to the low tide. Bring lunch, liquids and layers in case of chilly marine weather. FRS radios and scopes will be helpful. This trip will last into early afternoon. Meet Maureen at the Park and Ride off I-80 in West Sacramento at 7:30. From Sacramento, take the West Capitol Ave Exit #81; turn left at the light and then left again into the Park and Ride lot. Alternate meeting places are the Safeway parking lot in Fairfield by 8:15. From I-80W, take exit #47B right onto Waterman Road, then left into the Safeway parking lot. Or you can meet us at the Newell Preserve by 8:30. From I-80W, take the American Canyon Drive exit #36; turn right at the stop; proceed about half a mile and turn right onto Newell Drive. The trailhead is at the end of Newell which dead-ends at the parking lot.

Mather Lake is a great local birding location, with a nice variety of resident and migrant birds. Possibilities include Whitetailed Kites, Wild Turkey, California Quail, American Bittern, Green Heron and Piedbilled Grebes. Meet in the parking lot of Mather Regional Park; from Highway 50, go south on Zinfandel about 2-1/2 miles. After crossing Douglas Blvd take the first left into the park area. There is a \$5 per car entrance fee; your Sac County Parkway pass is valid here. This is a wonderful trip for beginning birders.

#### Saturday, October 24, 7am Bobelaine Audubon Sanctuary Leader: Cliff Hawley, 300-2495 yellowhammerCA@gmail.com

Bobelaine Sanctuary is a 430 acre remnant Gallery Riparian area on the Feather River opposite the mouth of the Bear River. There are about five miles of trails we can walk with nice river views and many native plants. We'll be looking for later fall migrants and returning wintering birds. Meet Cliff at the Bel Air shopping center on Arena Blvd. From Sacramento, take I-5 north to Arena Blvd, go west (left) over the freeway. Take the first left, Duckhorn Rd, and then turn right into the parking area. We will meet on the north side of the parking lot between Wells Fargo and Golden 1. If you wish to meet at Bobelaine, take Hwy 99 north toward Yuba City and about 2 miles north of the Feather River Bridge turn right on Laurel Avenue. Follow Laurel to the dead end at the Bobelaine parking lot. The group will probably arrive there about 7:30.

#### Saturday, October 24, 4:30pm—sunset Sandhill Cranes and Wintering Birds Cosumnes River Preserve/Delta area Trip by Save Our Sandhill Cranes, Inc Coordinator: Mike Savino, 446-1392

Our Sandhill Cranes are back! And your SOSC leaders will also be looking for the wide variety of waterfowl, shorebirds and raptors who feed in the flooded fields and marshy areas of the delta. After birding the boardwalk at the CRP Lost Slough Wetlands, we'll drive along Desmond Road, and possibly to Woodbridge Road or Staten Island to see flocks of cranes coming in to roost. Dress for changeable weather; bring binoculars, snacks and water if you wish. Meet at the CRP Visitor Center for a brief presentation of Sandhill Crane behavior, biology and status prior to the trip. From

Sacramento, take I-5 south to Twin Cities Road, (Exit #498); go left (east) about 1 mile to the stop sign at Franklin Blvd: turn right (south) on Franklin and, driving through the preserve, watch for the Visitor Center parking lot on your left. Meet at the Park and Ride off I-80 in West Sacramento. From Sacramento take the West Capitol Ave exit. Turn left, and the Park and Ride will be on your immediate left. This is a good trip for newer birders and experienced birders alike. #### Tuesday, October 27, 8am Colusa National Wildlife Refuge Leader: Dan Tankersley, 662-1290 dtankers@winfirst.com

Fall migration is underway, and Colusa NWR is a great location to view various species of newly arrived ducks and geese. We will spend a good amount of time on the viewing platform, and possibly take an easy walk on a level trail through riparian habitat next to the main viewing pond. We will take the short auto tour to finish our outing to this wonderful NWR. Scopes and FRS radios will be helpful on this trip. Meet Dan at the Mace Blvd Park and Ride. From Sacramento, take I-80 west towards Davis to Mace Blvd (Exit #75); turn right (north) and then right again at the signal light to the Park and Ride entrance a short distance beyond Ikeda's Market. We will meet on the south side of the parking lot in the row nearest the big round water tank. Rain, strong wind, or thick fog cancels.

Bring snacks and liquids as the trip will end in the very late morning to very early afternoon.

#### Friday, October 30, 8:30am Cosumnes River Preserve Leader: Cathie LaZier, 457-6882 empid@earthlink.net

Our Sandhill Cranes are back for the winter, joining swans, geese and a wide variety of duck species. Yellowlegs and Wilson's Snipe will be in the shallower water, and other shorebirds are possible. We'll walk the CRP boardwalk loop first; then drive along Desmond Road for more views of waterfowl. Meet Cathie at the CRP Visitor Center parking lot about 8:30am. Bring water and snacks and dress for changeable weather. Spotting scopes are helpful if you have them. This is a great trip for beginning birders. From Sacramento, take I-5 south to Twin Cities Road, (Exit #498); go left (east) about 1 mile to the stop sign at Franklin Blvd: turn right (south) on Franklin and, driving through the preserve, watch for the Visitor Center parking lot on your left.

#### Saturday, October 31, 8am Mather Lake Leader: Wayne Blunk, 876-0457 Wayne.Blunk@gmail.com

Mather Lake is one of Wayne's favorite birding locations at all seasons of the year, and he always turns up quite a list of bird species. Possibilities include Yellowheaded Blackbird, Common Yellowthroat, American Bittern, Green Heron, and Piedbilled Grebe. Meet in the parking lot of Mather Regional Park; from Highway 50, go south on Zinfandel about 2-1/2 miles. After crossing Douglas Blvd take the first left into the park area. There is a \$5 per car entrance fee; your Sac County Parkway pass is valid here. This is a wonderful trip for beginning birders.

## ENDANGERED SPECIES LEAD COUNTY TO RECONSIDER MATHER DEVELOPMENT

Sacramento County supervisors have scuttled a plan 25 years in the making to redevelop the former Mather Air Force Base because of concerns about endangered and threatened species.

Supervisors late Wednesday directed staff to come up with a different direction for the former base after an overflow crowd overwhelmingly indicated opposition to the plan calling for industrial, commercial and residential development and major infrastructure improvements. More than 300 people crowded into board chambers or watched monitors outside as the board held a four-hour hearing. About 40 people spoke to the board, with all but one indicating opposition to the project. They raised concerns about additional traffic and environmental harm.

He has led natural history birding tours for Save Our SandhillCranes for the last ten years. When he is not fighting or trying to improve a poorly sited or conceived development, or working to improve policy to include more habitat protection, he travels far and wide seeking out the last great remaining habitats. Several years back he renewed his interest in photography in an effort to record the lessons he learned, and the beauty he experienced while traveling, so that he could bring them back and share them with others. The trip to Japan featured in this slide presentation was particularly rich in both lessons and beauty, and the photographic conditions there were unparalleled resulting in a slew of "once in a lifetime" images.

# FIRST LIVE-STREAMING VIEWS OF WILD CONDOR NESTS CONNECT PEOPLE TO RARE SPECIES

Today, people around the world have the unprecedented opportunity to observe nesting California Condors and their young chicks in real time via live-streaming webcams. Biologists installed webcams in two California Condor nests located in the rugged terrain of Ventura and Monterey counties to enable the public to watch California Condor chicks and their parents. "What started out as a way for biologists to monitor the health of endangered California Condor chicks and the breeding success of the species has become an important tool for outreach about this incredibly rare bird," said Joseph Brandt, a USW Service biologist. 

#### Seasonal Observations

## August 1 to August 31 Rare and Unusual Bird Reports www.cvbirds.org/ListServ.htm

While Sacramento area residents still suffer the hot days of summer, by August there are many birds to keep them company. Shorebird migration peaks from mid-July through August and by early August the numbers of migrant warblers, flycatchers and other songbirds are often quite impressive, especially in the first couple hours of light on hot summer days. This August, despite the unusually dry conditions brought on by the continued drought, provided many highlights and a good showing of the expected migrant shorebirds and songbirds that keep us heading into the field.

After many reports from the Yolo Bypass

Wildlife Area (YBWA) last month, one-totwo Least Bitterns were seen and photographed at the Bridgeway Island Pond near West Sacramento from 8/7-9. Shorebird highlights included a handful of Willet and Marbled Godwit reports from traditional sites in Yolo County, along with a single Willet report from Sacramento County at the Sacramento Regional WTP (SRWTP) on 8/7 and a single Marbled Godwit at Cosumnes River Preserve on 8/15. The only Sanderling report of the month was from the Woodland WTP on 8/7. A Semipalmated Sandpiper was found at Camanche Reservoir in Amador County on 8/7, apparently a first county record, and two were found there the following day. Another Semipalmated Sandpiper was found and photographed at SRWTP from 8/24-26. The only August Baird's

**Sandpiper** reports were of one at the Woodland WTP on 8/12-13 and one at the Anatolia Vernal Pool Preserve off Sunrise Blvd on 8/22, with two reported there on 8/24.

The pair of **Least Terns** that nested at SRWTP had two flying young on 8/18, though only one juvenile was seen after 8/19. It was regularly seen into early September along with one or both adults. A **Yellow-billed Cuckoo** was reported calling and was briefly seen near the Mayhew Drain, downstream from the Gristmill access along the American River Parkway (ARP). The male **Costa's Hummingbird** that was banded in September 2013 has since been sporadically reported along Putah Creek between Davis and Winters, including several times this August.

or immature **American Redstart** found at the Gristmill access to ARP on 8/30. There was a flurry of **Green-tailed Towhee** reports, with one along Putah Creek near Pedrick Rd on 8/22, one at the Wood Duck Lakes along South River Rd near West Sacramento on 8/26, and one at the Sacramento Bypass off of Rd 126 on 8/30. A male **Indigo Bunting** photographed at YBWA on 8/8-9 was a nice surprise, and a flyover **Pine Siskin** on 8/31 at Grassland Regional Park in Yolo County was the only one for the season so far.
